### Live fish shipment intercepted at Palawan airport

According to Inquirer.net (31 December 2007), an illegal shipment involving 71 live red groupers was intercepted by enforcement authorities at Puerto Princesa International Airport. The Mayor of Puerto Princesa City suspended three of the city's enforcement personnel on the suspicion that they conspired with the shipper of the fish, and ordered that the fish be released immediately into Puerto Princesa Bay.
