

Vili listened carefully to the doctor and wondered what he meant.






He thought about it for a long time until an idea came to him. He had to find a rainbow.

The next day during art class, the teacher showed everybody the works of a famous painter called Kandinsky. Suddenly, Vili had another idea.




He decided to paint his plates in Kandinsky's style. "Woohoo! That really looks like rainbows! I'm sure that's what the doctor meant."
