

## HOW TO USE THIS BOOK

The group should watch the Love Patrol DVD before doing the related activities. Ideally, the activities for each episode should be carried out before the students watch the next episode. If not, you can use the photos in the chapters to remind the students of the story.

The activities in this book are aimed to allow students or members of the community to express their feelings and opinions. The activities are all interactive and questions do not usually have right or wrong answers. The activities allow the participants to draw on their own experiences.

Feel free to pick those activities that you think are relevant to your students. You may not have time for more than one activity per episode.

Although Love Patrol was made in Vanuatu, the issues are relevant throughout the Pacific and beyond! Please use examples from your own country wherever possible.

If there are activities you would like to try, but class time is limited, you may want to use them as extra-curricular/break-up activities or during reading periods.

## SMALL GROUP WORK

Some students feel uncomfortable talking in front of the whole class, whereas they feel quite at ease discussing in small groups of five or six, so many activities use small groups or pairs.

(a) Each group/pair can do every question with one person reporting,

OR if time is short

(b) each group/pair can be assigned a different question.

Others can comment on the answers given.

## READING PASSAGES

The reading passages are taken from the TV series and use very short sentences. This should make it easy and enjoyable for students to read. There is no need for students to read to the whole class, but by reading to each other hopefully their confidence in reading aloud will increase. It may be best to do this outside, if noise is an issue.

## SYMBOLS KEY

The symbols help you readily locate certain kinds of activities. All activities have a recommended time allocated to them, and group numbers. You can make an activity as short or long as you choose, but keeping it short and sharp means you can easily choose what will fit into a lesson.
