In this report new statistics on National Accounts and the National Census 2002 are included. National Accounts shows information on the various contributors towards the gross domestic product. For the Census 2002, information is given on the population characteristics of Tuvalu.

It is our aim that the report will eventually be able to capture and report on all major economic and social statistical indicators of Tuvalu. Towards this end, we appreciate your co-operation in providing to the Central Statistics Division (CSD) any statistical information that can be included in this report.

The CSD welcomes any feedback, comments or suggestions on the contents of the report, as well as on how this quarterly statistical report can be further improved.

Many thanks to the staff of the CSD for their efforts and time spent in compiling the report. Thanks also to Kim Robertson from SPC for assisting with the trade and migration data and to Rodney Lewington for compiling the national accounts. And tonnes of thanks to the various data providers for their contribution and support in providing the relevant raw data and statistics.

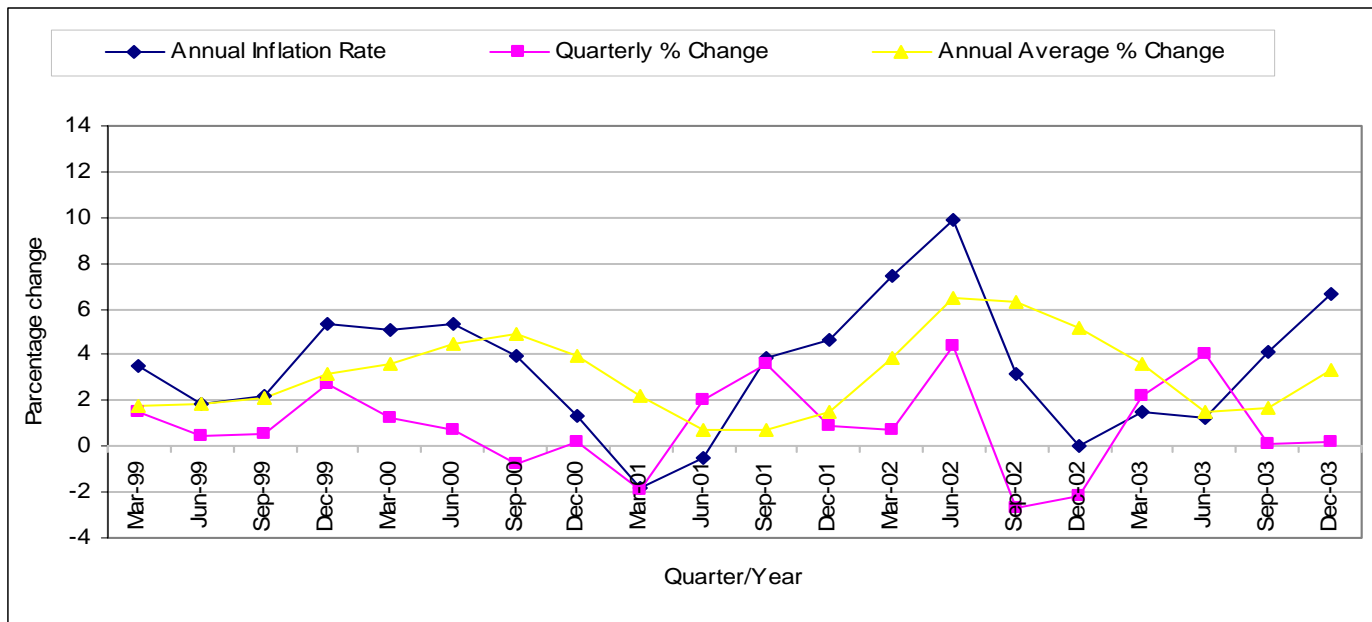

# 1. TUVALU CONSUMER PRICE INDEX

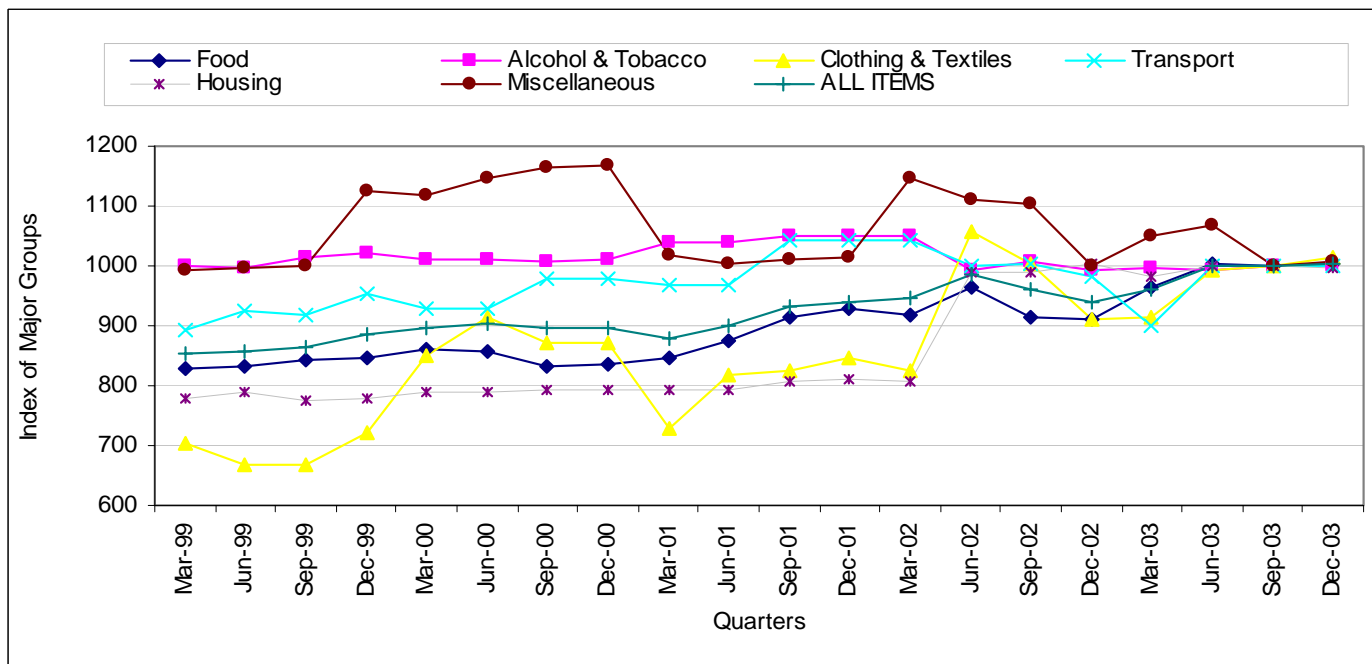
Graph 1 depicts the Tuvalu Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the fourth quarter 2003 experiences a quarterly increase of 0.2%. This change resulted from the increase in the overall index of the priced commodities from 1000 in the third quarter to 1002.2 for the fourth quarter 2003. The increase brings the annual inflation rate to 6.7% as compared to 4.1% recorded during the third quarter of 2003. (Refer to Table 1)

Graph 2 provides the movements in the CPI for the last five years. All groups express a steady increase since 1999. For the fourth quarter 2003, all the groups except the Housing recorded an increase in the overall items-to-price. (Refer to Table 2).

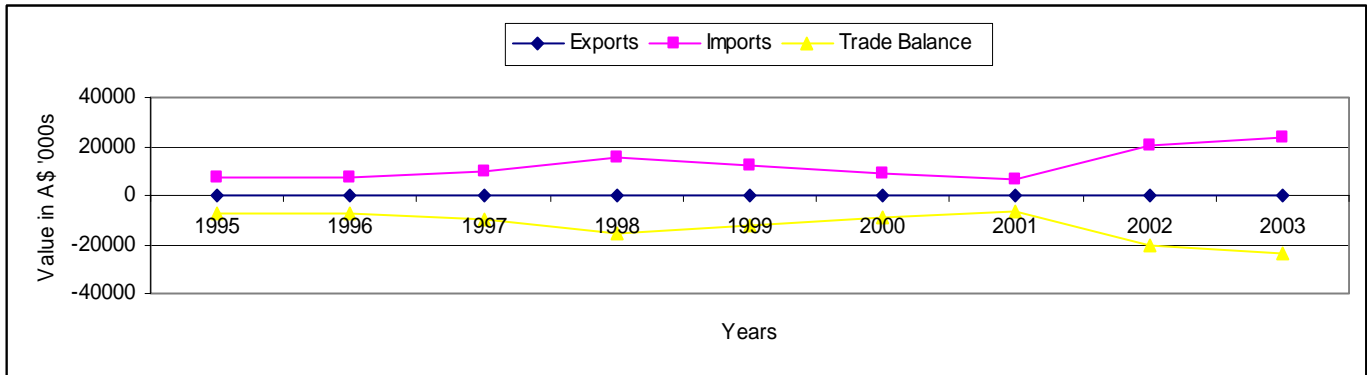
Graph 2: Quarterly index of the groups that contribute to the CPI



## 2. TRADE

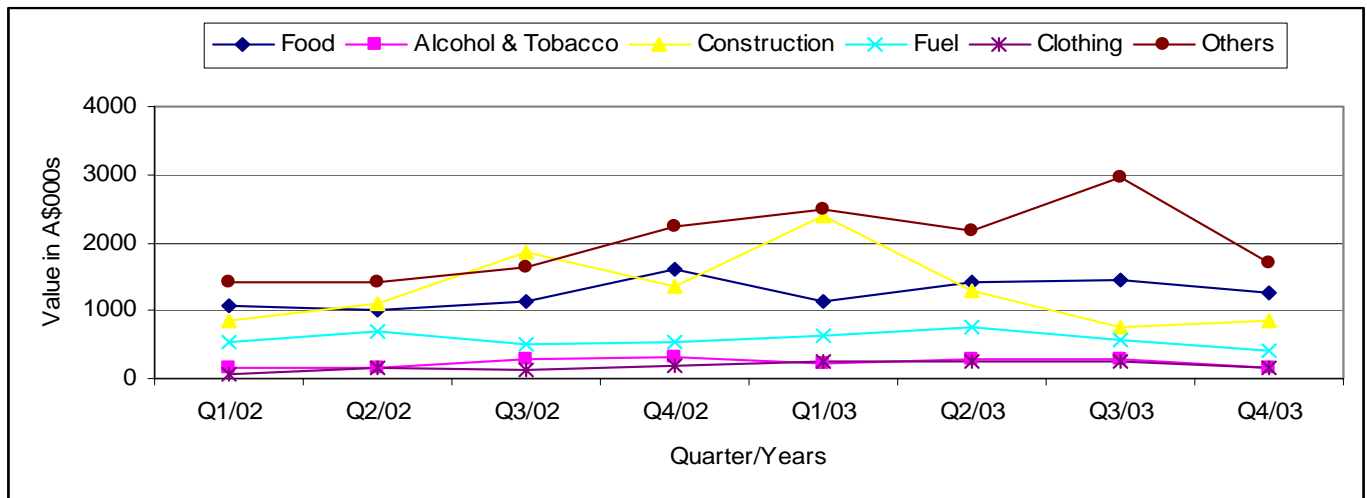
Graph 2.1 shows the annual value of merchandise imports for the year ended December 2003 is A\$24 million, a 1.2 % increase from \$20 million for the year ended December 2002. Total imports for 2000 and 2001 are provisional. Also note the export figures for the last four months of 2003 are not available. (Refer to Table 3).

Graph 2.1: Exports and imports by year A\$CIF



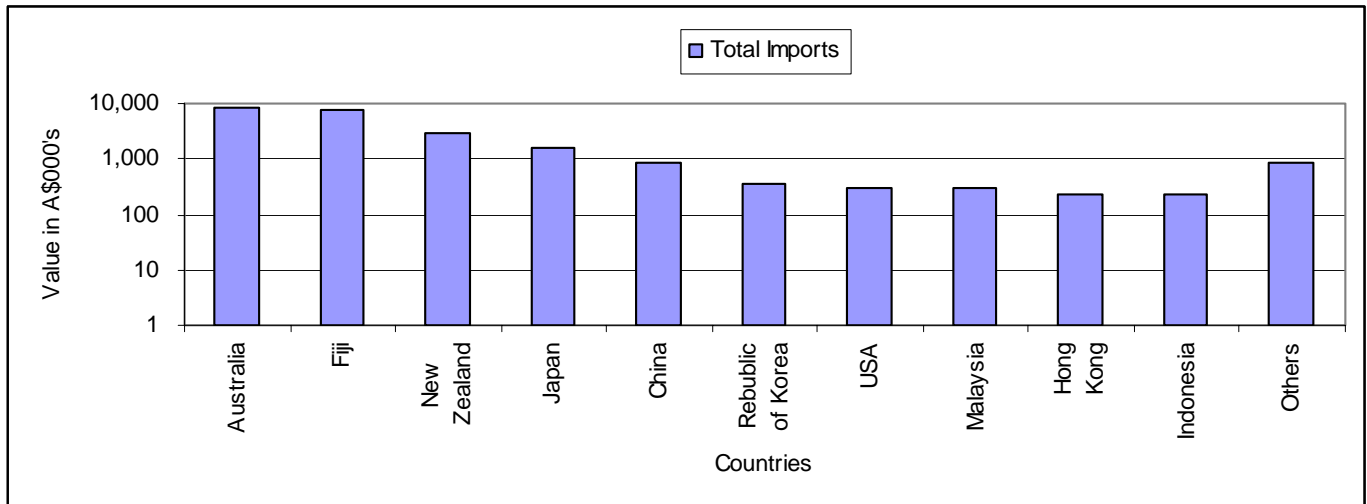
Graph 2.2 depicts the group Others as the most dominant except for the third quarter 2003 where the group Construction exceeded Others by A\$.2 million. Imports in the Construction group were above A\$1 million from the second quarter 2002 to second quarter 2003 during the construction of the hospital and the new government building. Graph 2.3 shows that imports from Australia, Fiji, New Zealand and Japan are above A\$1 million. (Refer to Table 7).

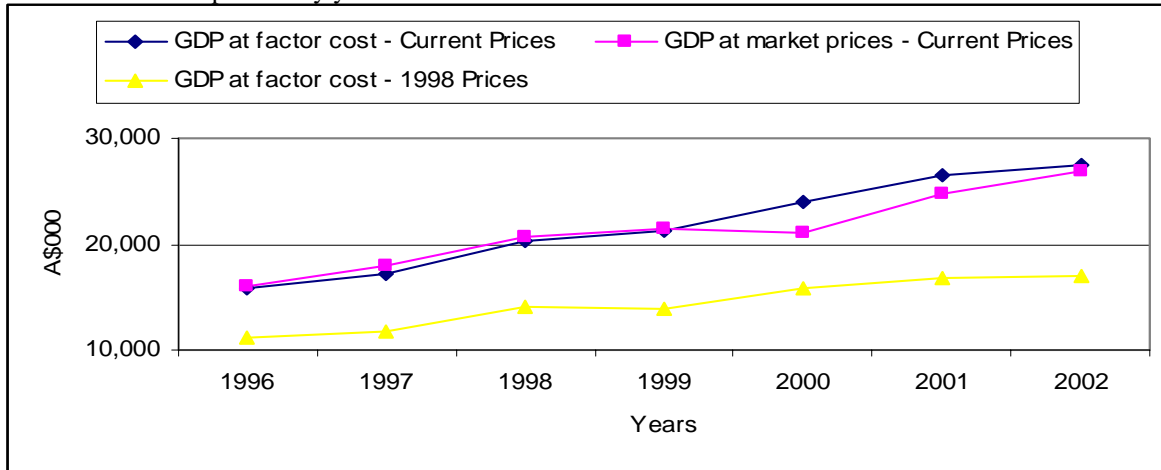
Graph 2.3: Total imports by country of origin A\$ CIF - 2003

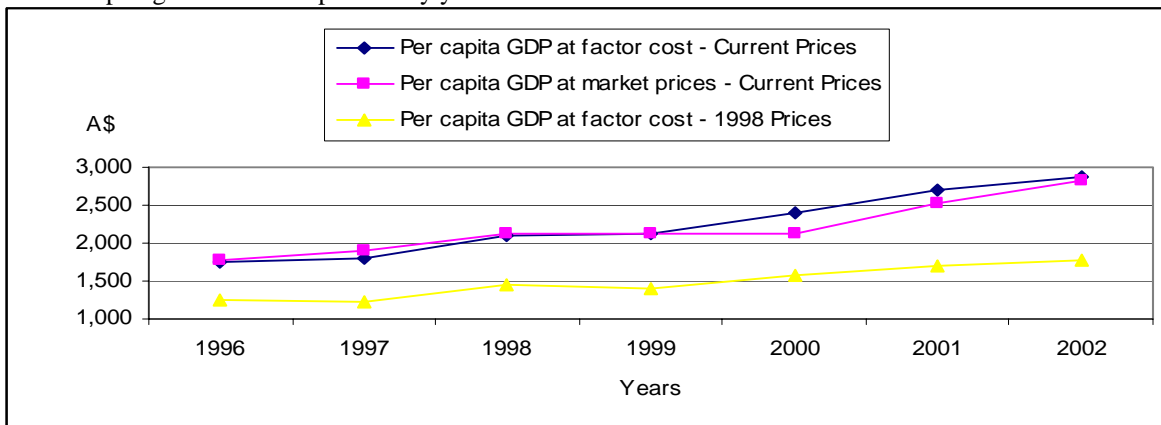

Graph 3.1: Gross domestic product by years



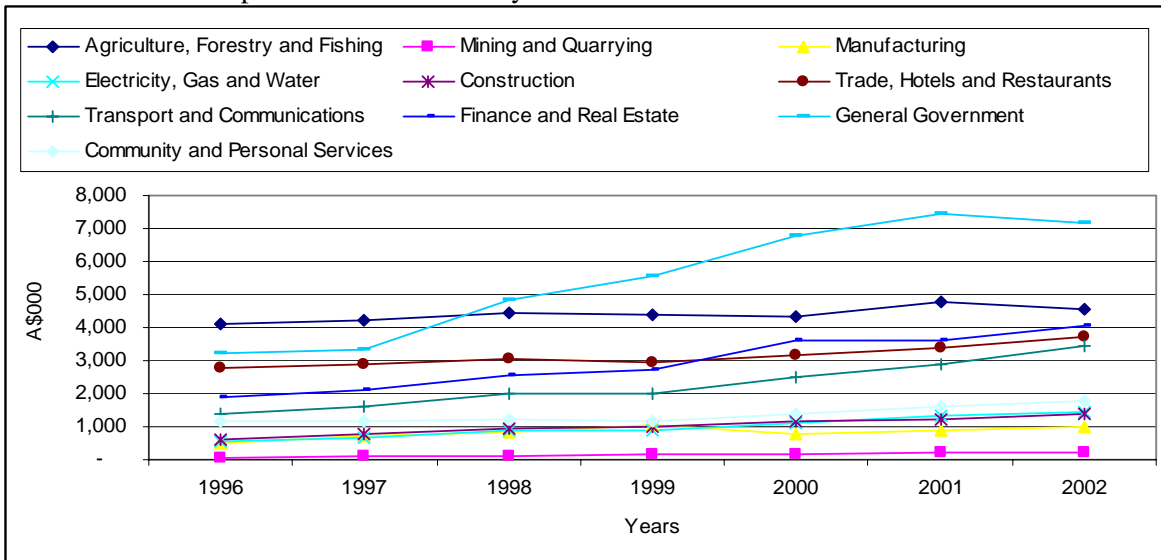

Graph 3.3: Gross domestic product at factor cost by industries

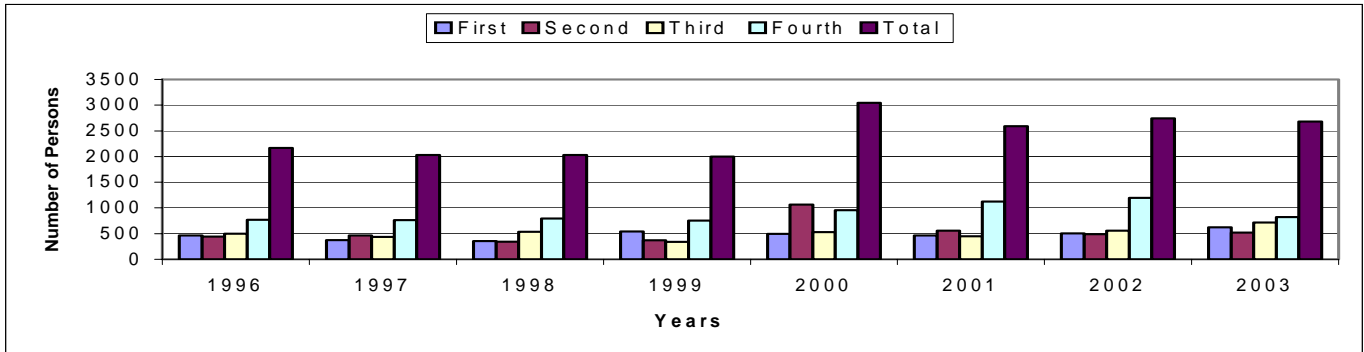


# 4. MIGRATION

## 4.1 RESIDENT ARRIVALS

Graph 4.1 shows the arrivals in the fourth quarter 2002 and 2003 were 1217 and 856 respectively, a decrease by 48%. The decrease can be attributed to the more malaga<sup>a</sup> in the fourth quarter of 2002 than 2003. For 2003, the fourth quarter records the highest number of arrivals as it is the period where most residents return for the Christmas holidays. (Refer to Table 10).

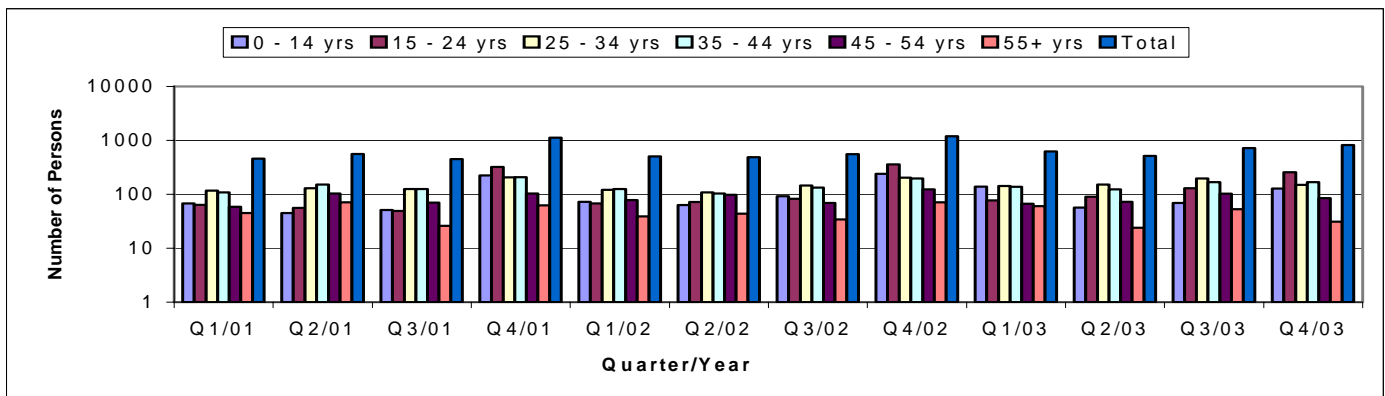
Graph 4.1: Resident arrivals by quarters and years

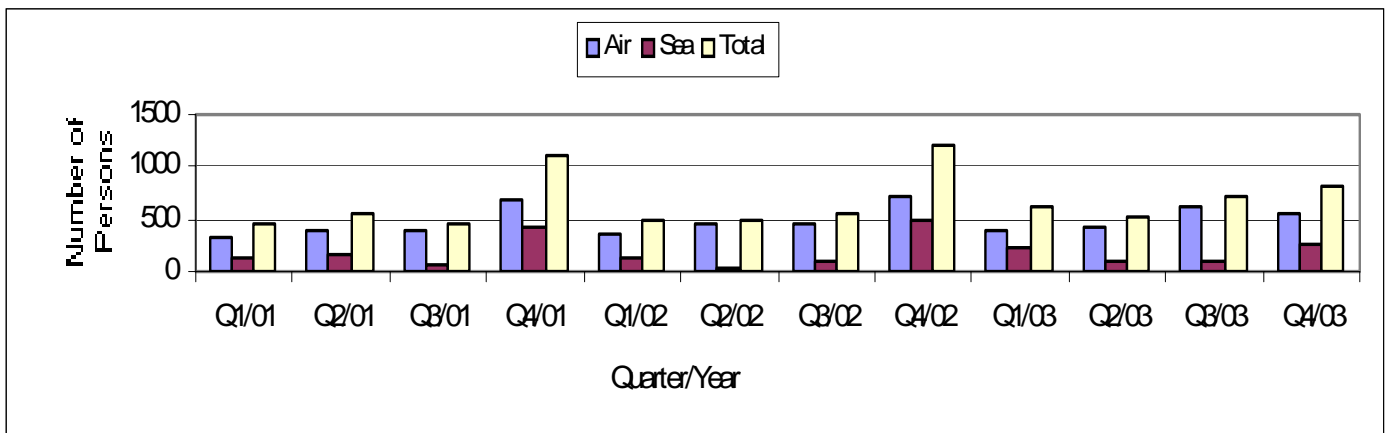

Graph 4.2: Resident arrivals by age groups and quarters by years.



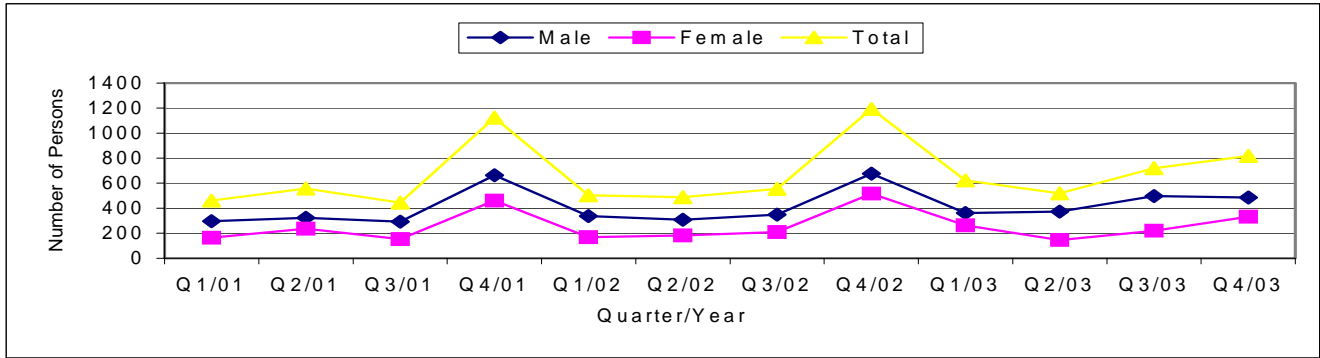

Graph 4.3: Resident arrivals by mode of transport and quarters by years



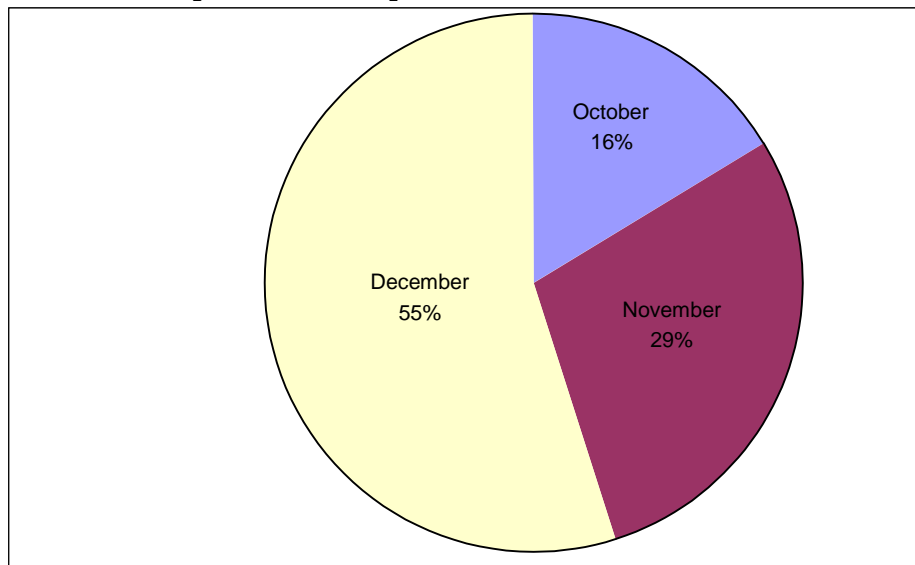

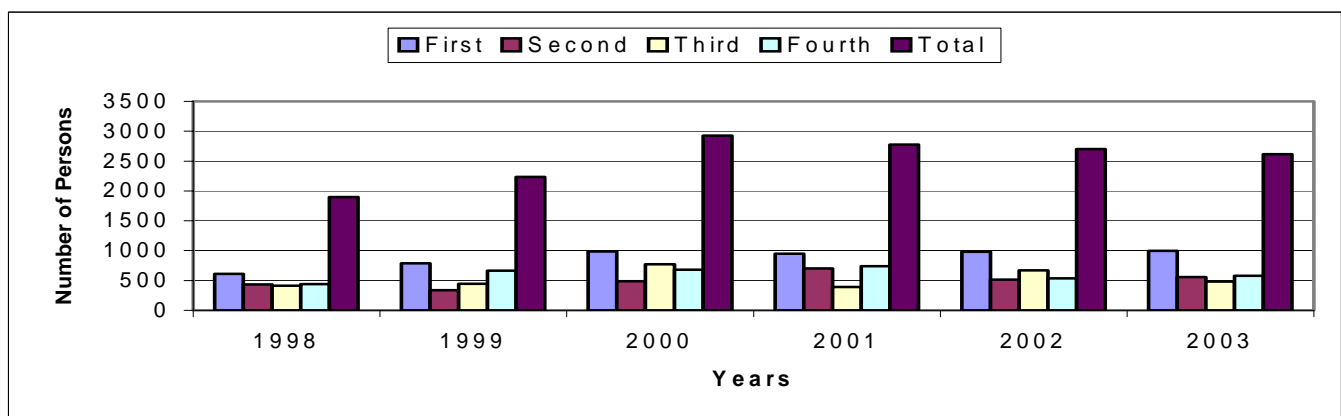
**Graph 4.5: Fourth quarter resident arrivals 2003**

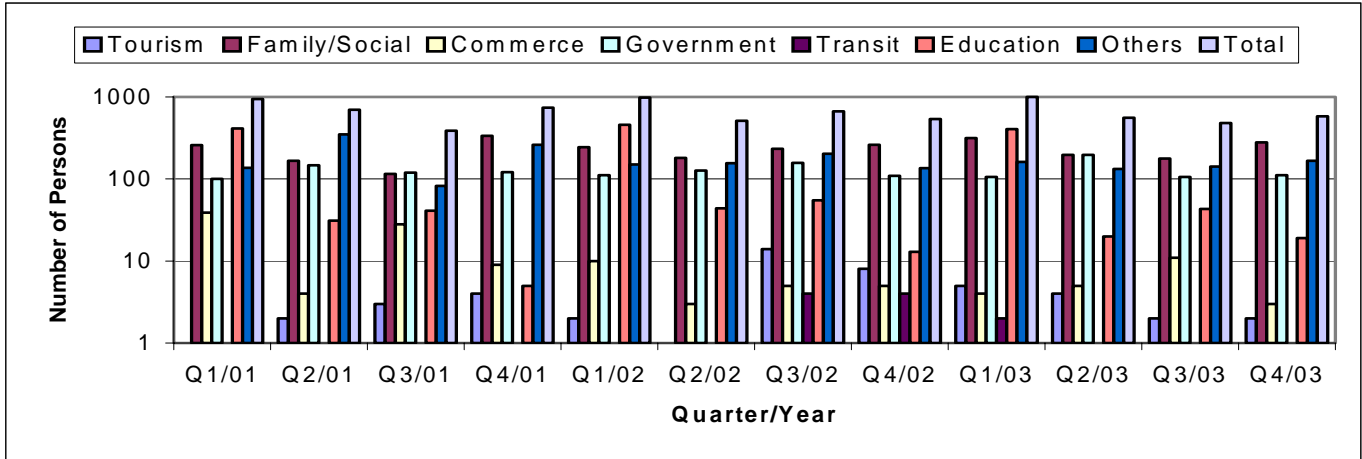

**Graph 4.6: Resident departures by quarters and years**



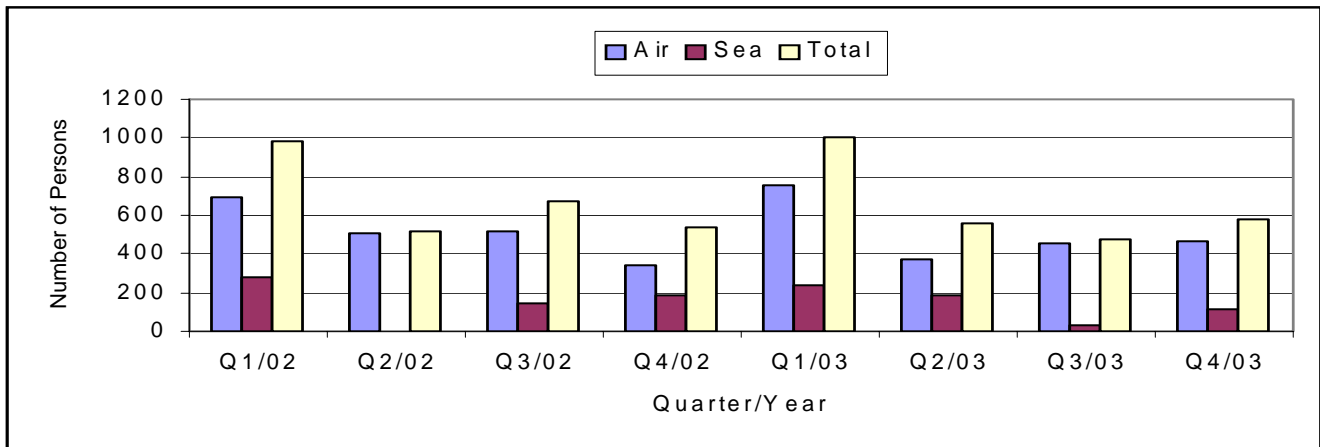

**Graph 4.7: Resident departures by quarters/years and purpose of travel**



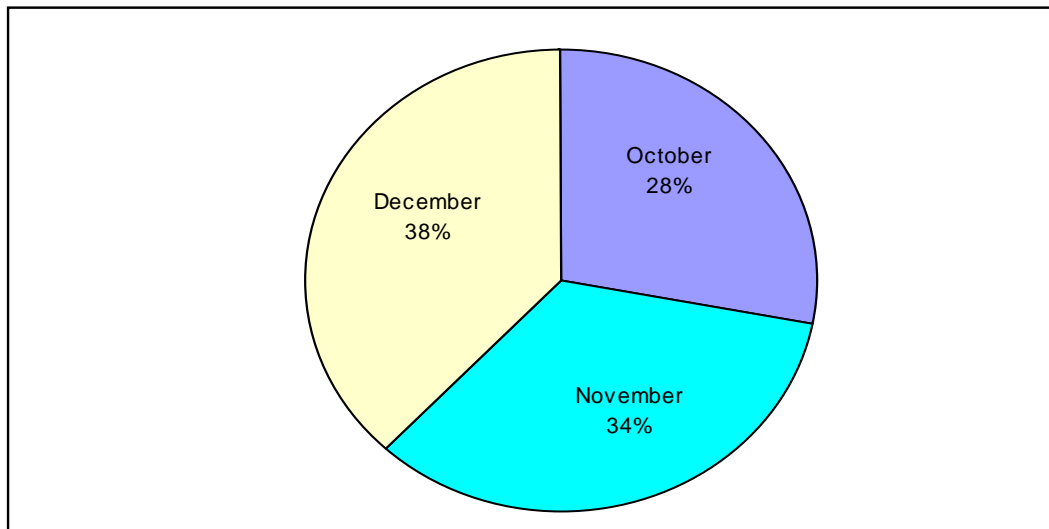

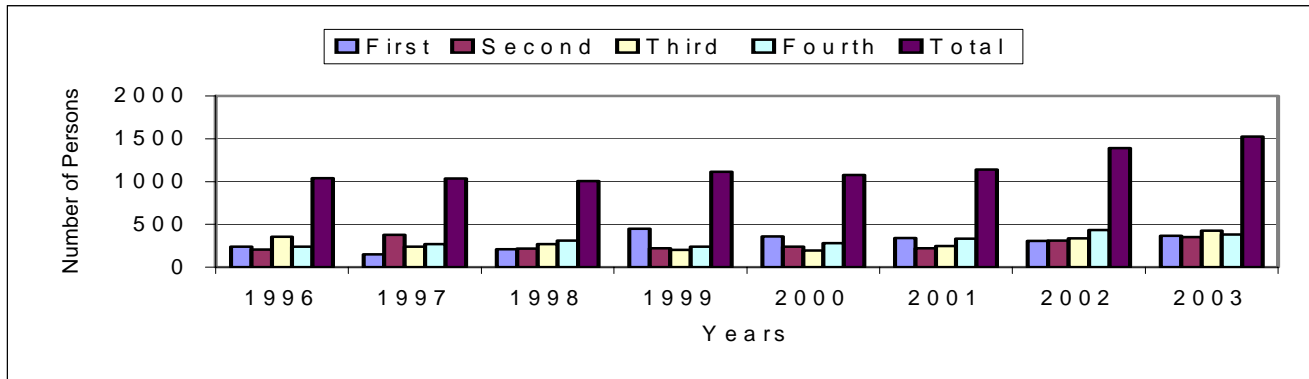
**Graph 4.9: Fourth quarter resident departures 2003**

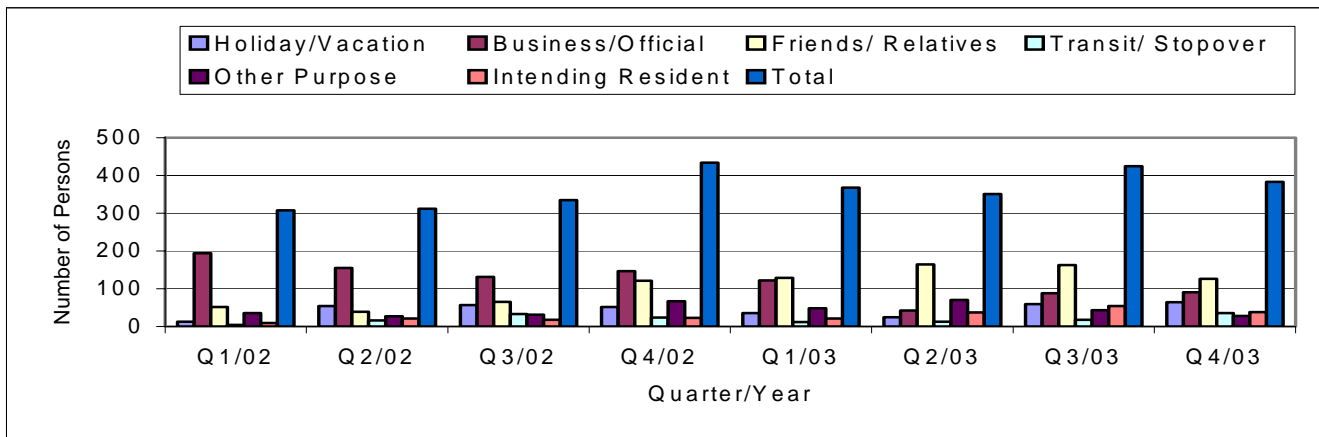

**Graph 4.10: Visitor arrivals by quarter and years**



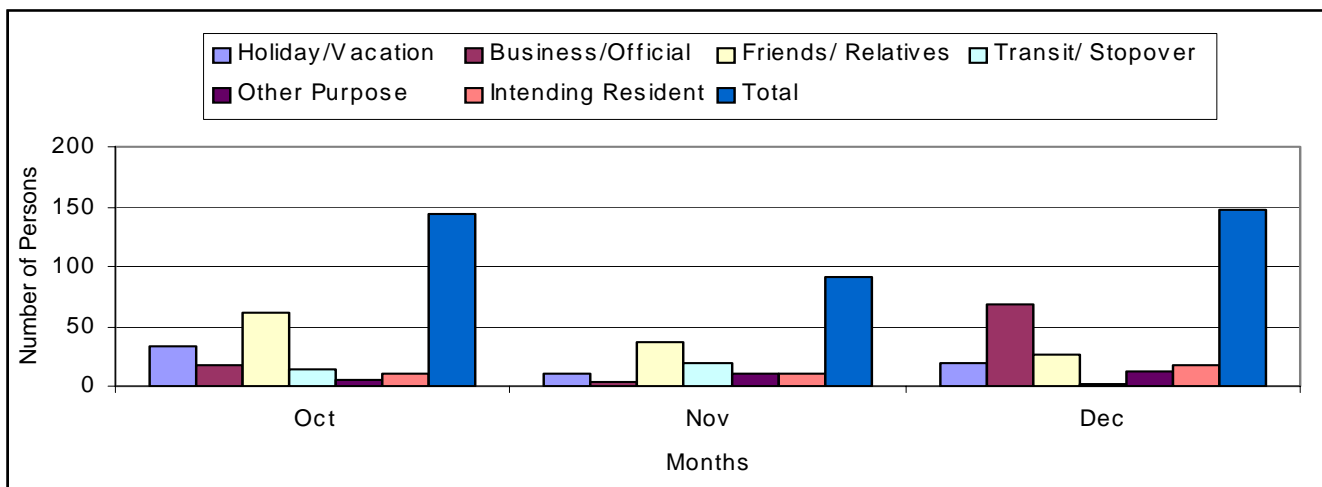

**Graph 4.11: Visitor arrivals by quarter/years and purpose of visit**



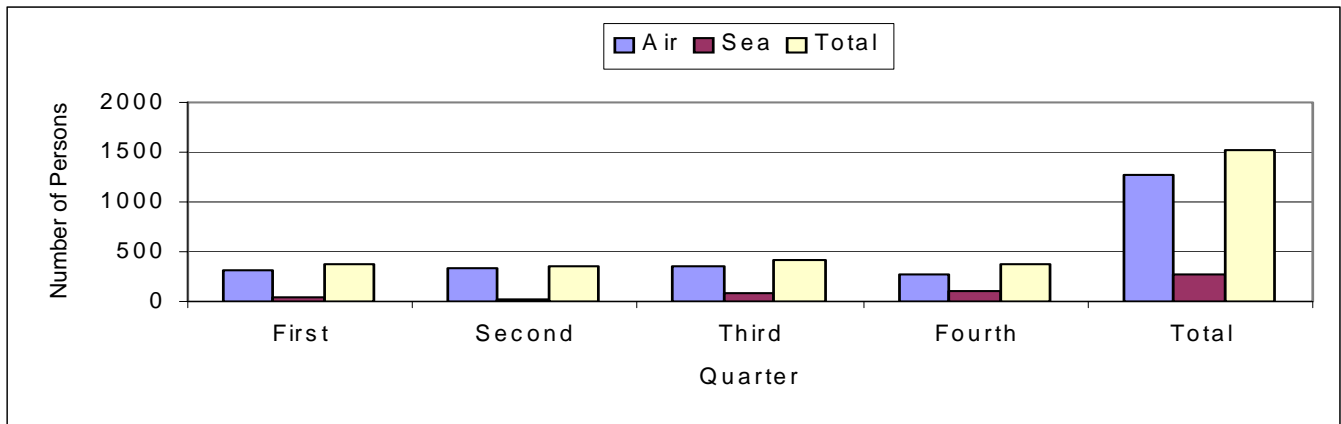

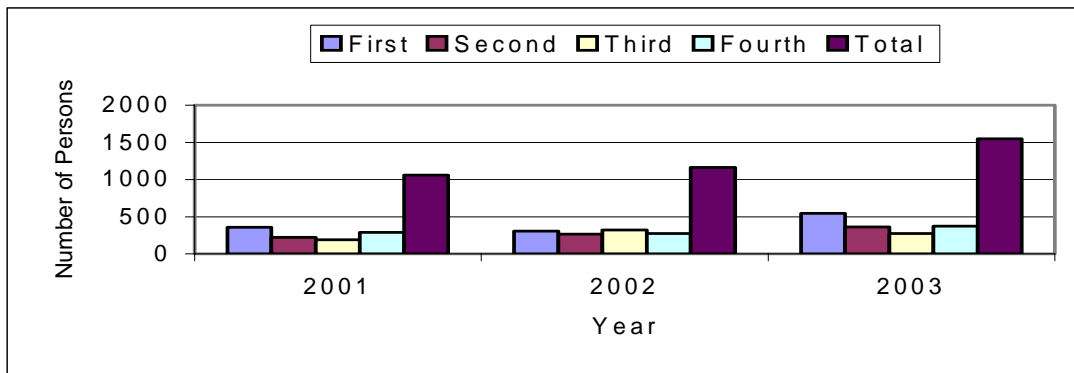
**Graph 4.13: Visitor arrivals by quarter and mode of transport - 2003**

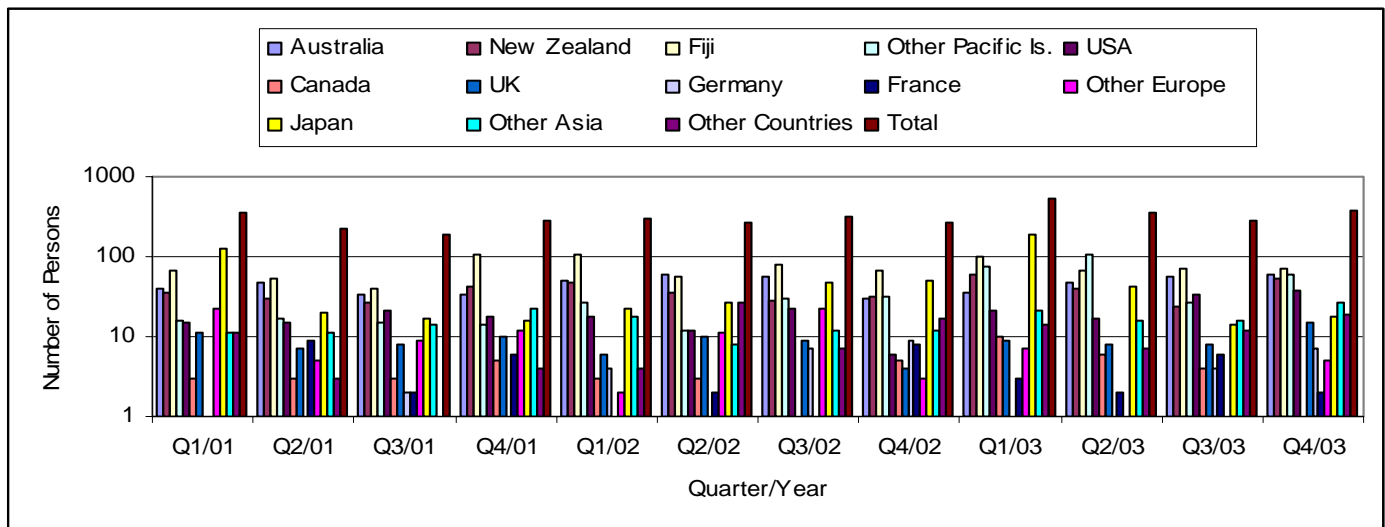

**Graph 4.14: Visitor departures by quarter and year**



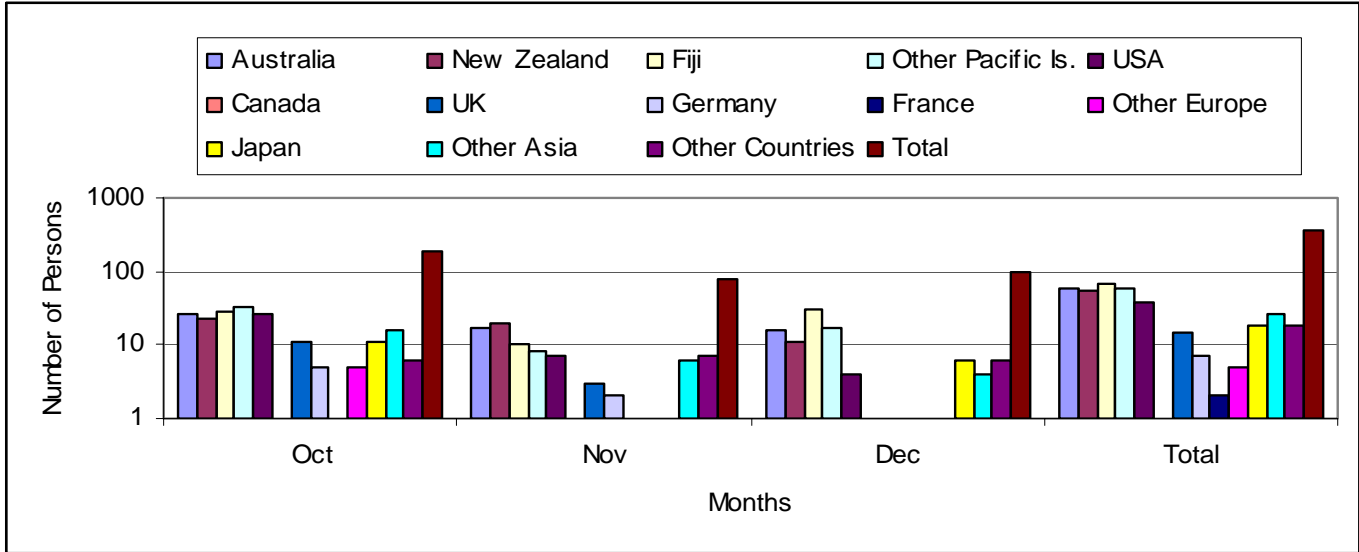

**Graph 4.15: Visitor departures by quarter/year and country**



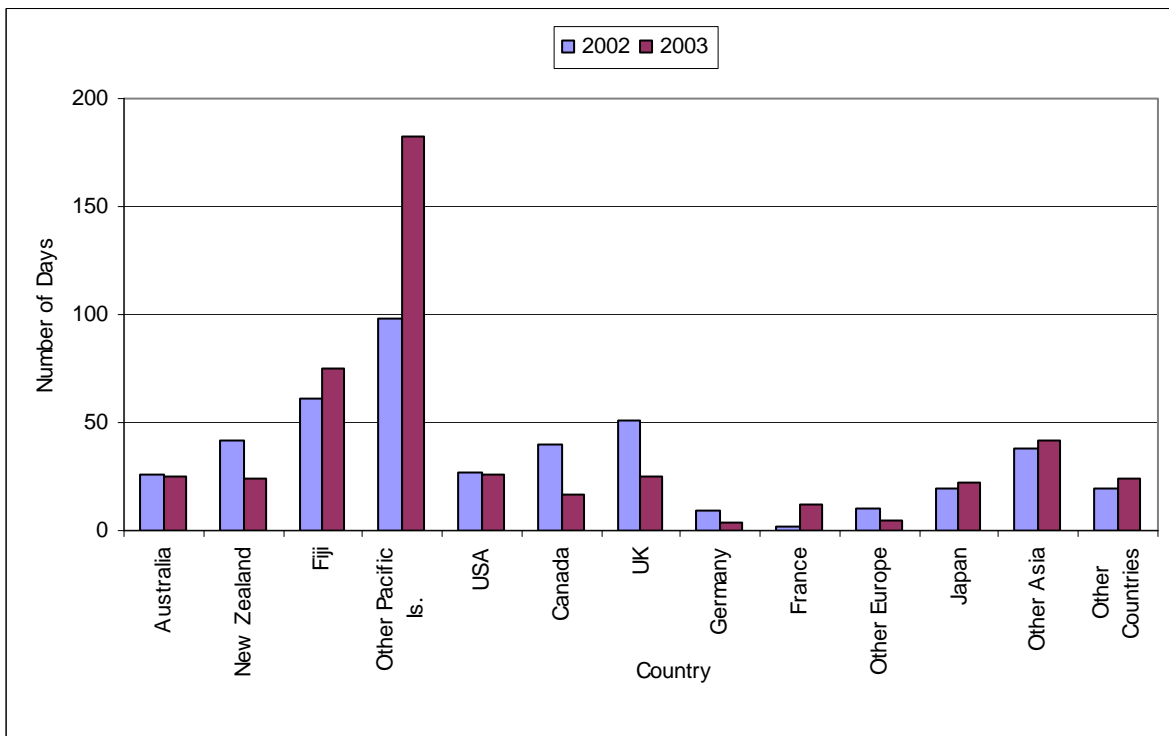

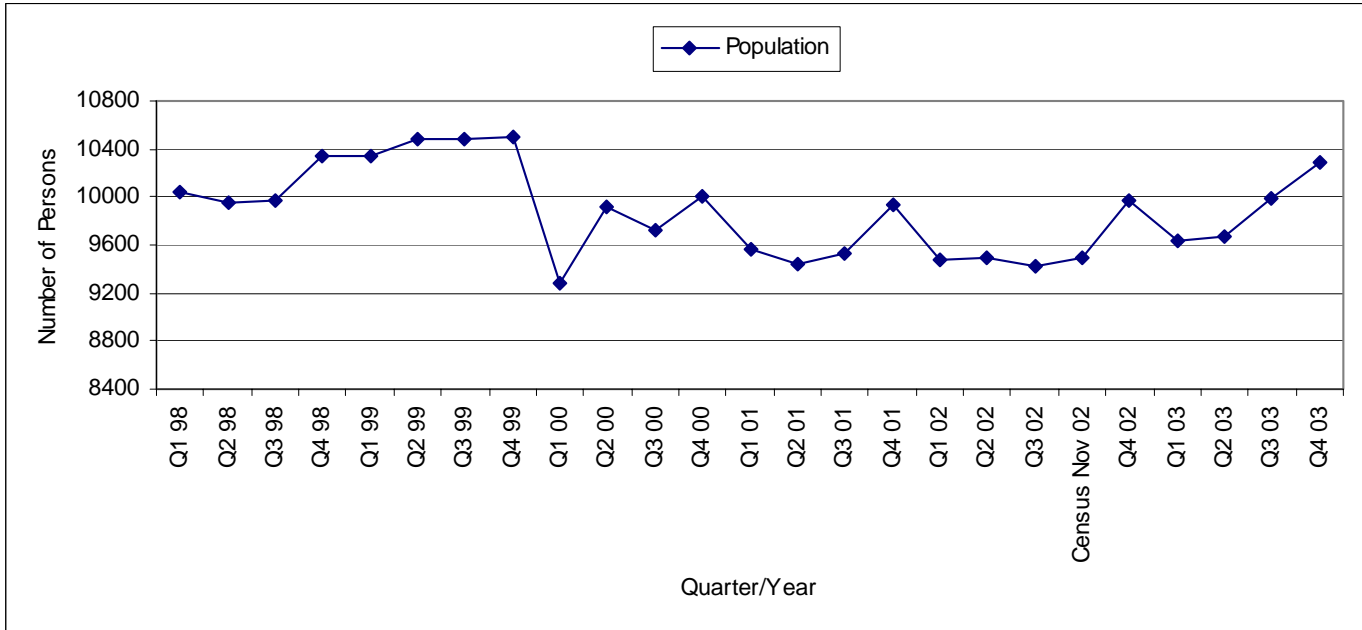
**Graph 4.17: Visitor average length of stay in days by year**

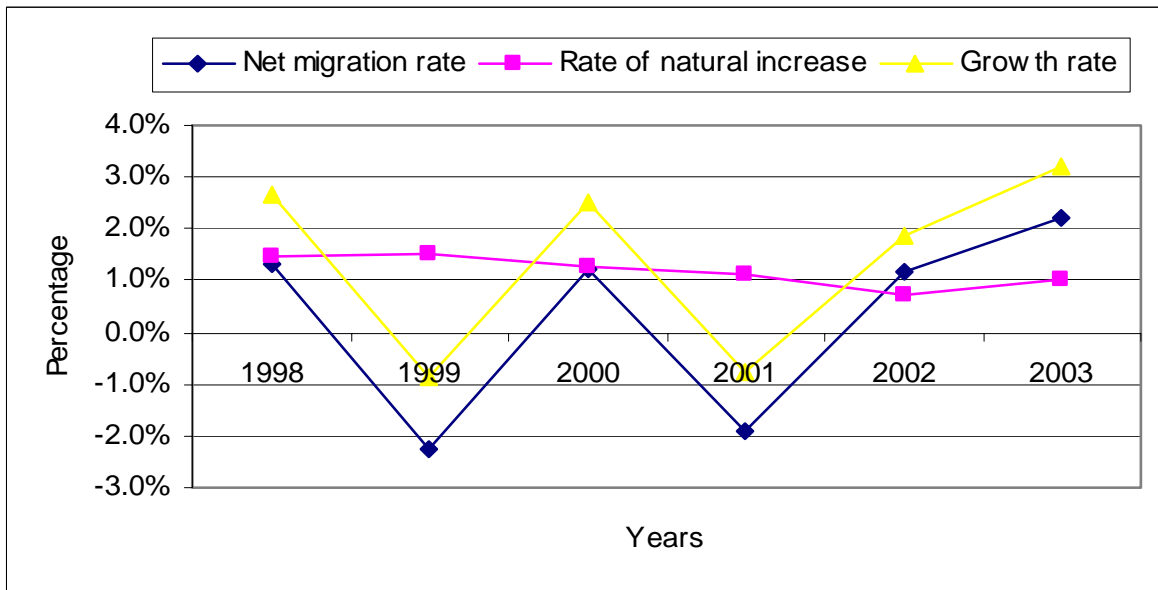

**Graph 5.2: Rates of resident population changes by years**

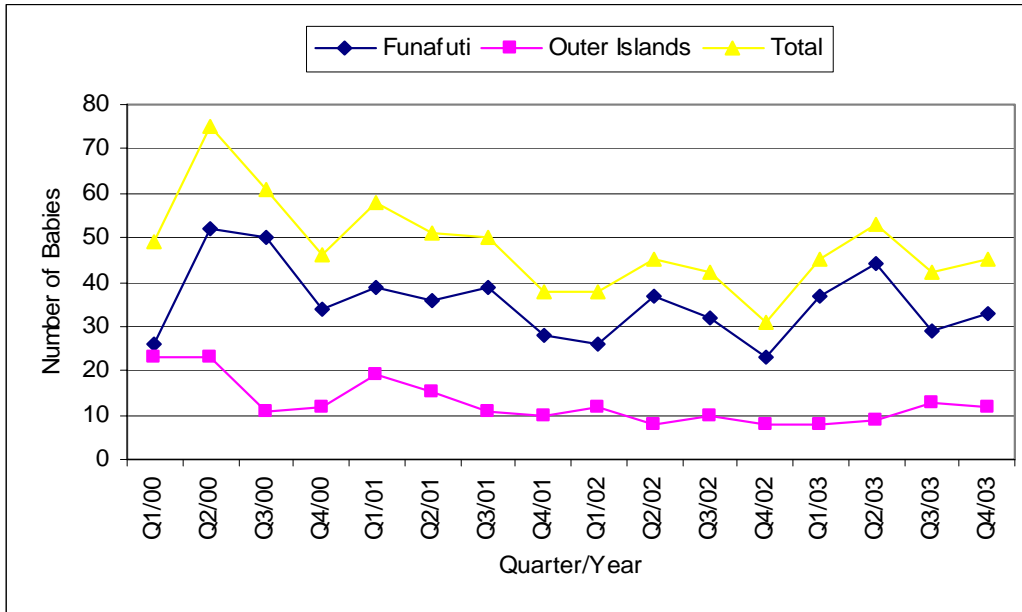

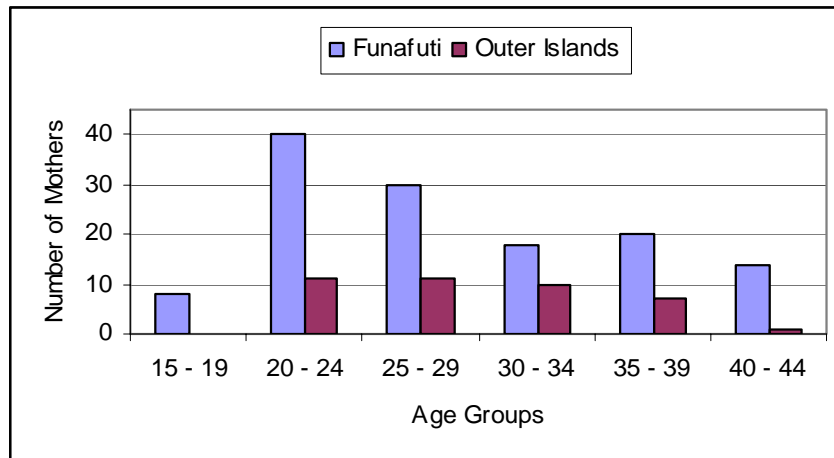
Graph 6.1 indicates the fourth quarter 2003 births as 45, a 45% increase from 31 of the fourth quarter 2002. (Refer to Table 32).

**Graph 6.1: Quarterly births by islands**

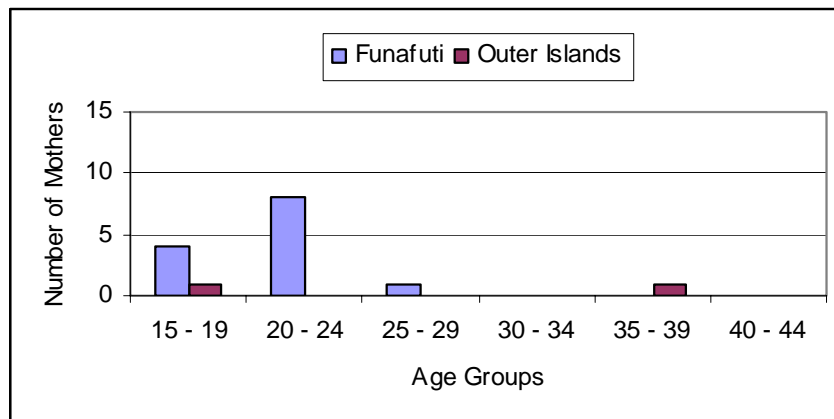

**Graph 6.3: Married mothers by islands and age groups - 2003**



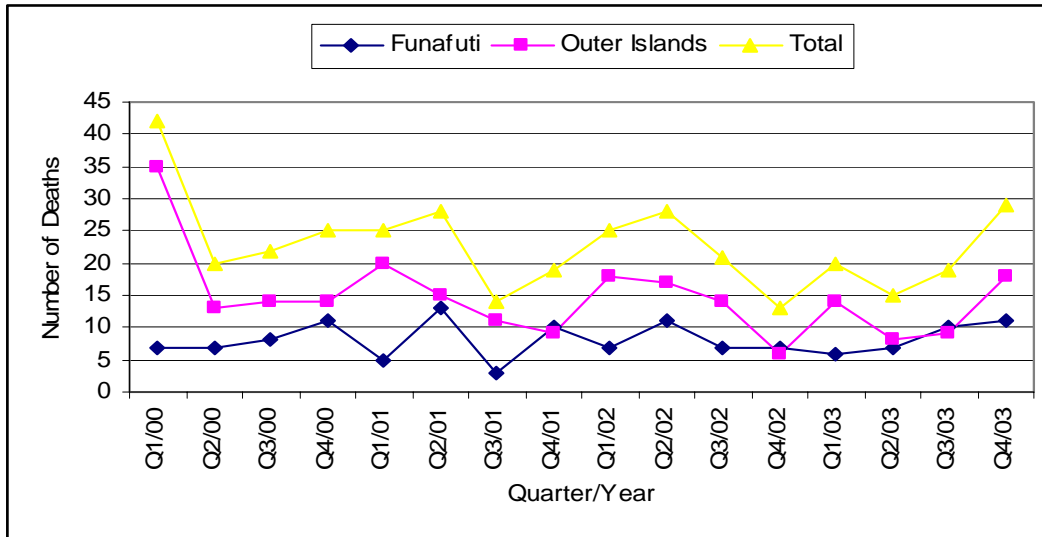
**Graph 6.4: Single married mothers by islands and age groups - 2003**

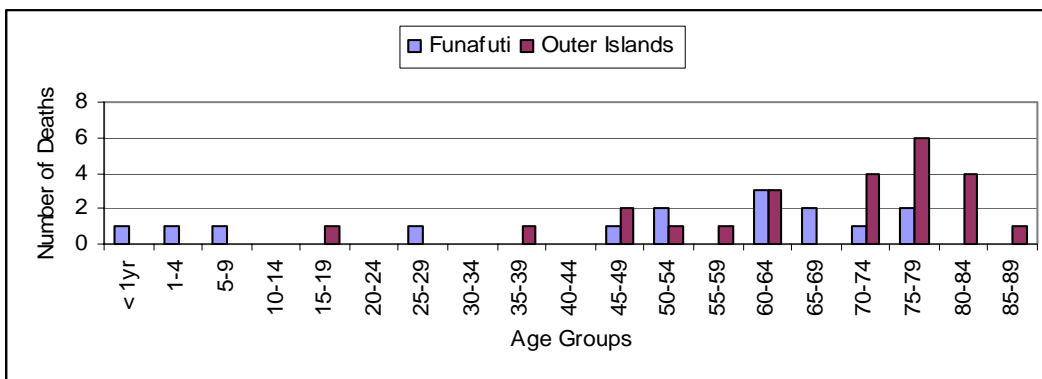

**Graph 6.5: Deaths by quarter/year and island of occurrence**



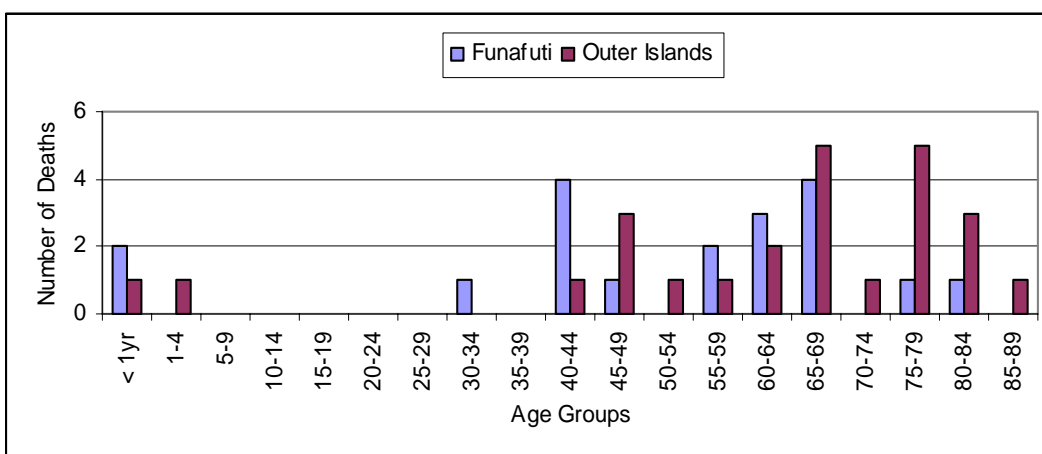

**Graph 6.7: Female deaths by age groups and island – 2003**

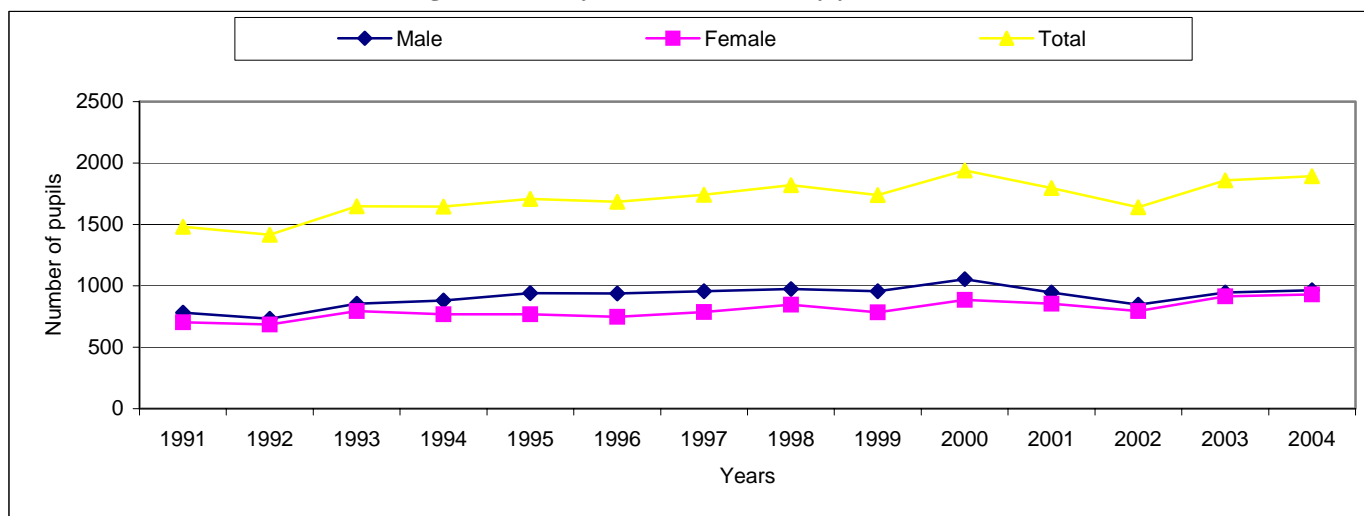


## 7. EDUCATION

### 7.1 PRIMARY SCHOOL

Figure 7.1 shows that the enrolment trend at the Primary school level is fluctuating but at an increasing rate with more boys than girls for each year since 1991. (Refer to Table 40).

**Fig 7.1: Primary school enrolment by year and sex.**

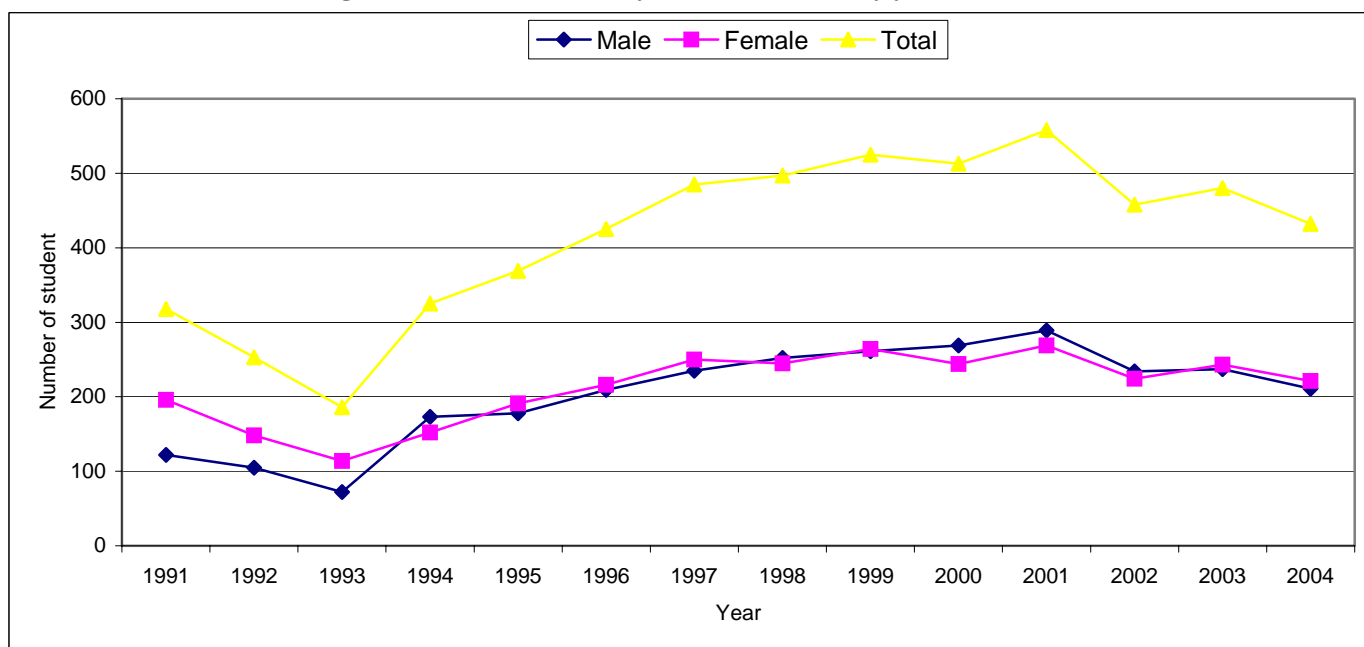

### 7.2 SECONDARY SCHOOL

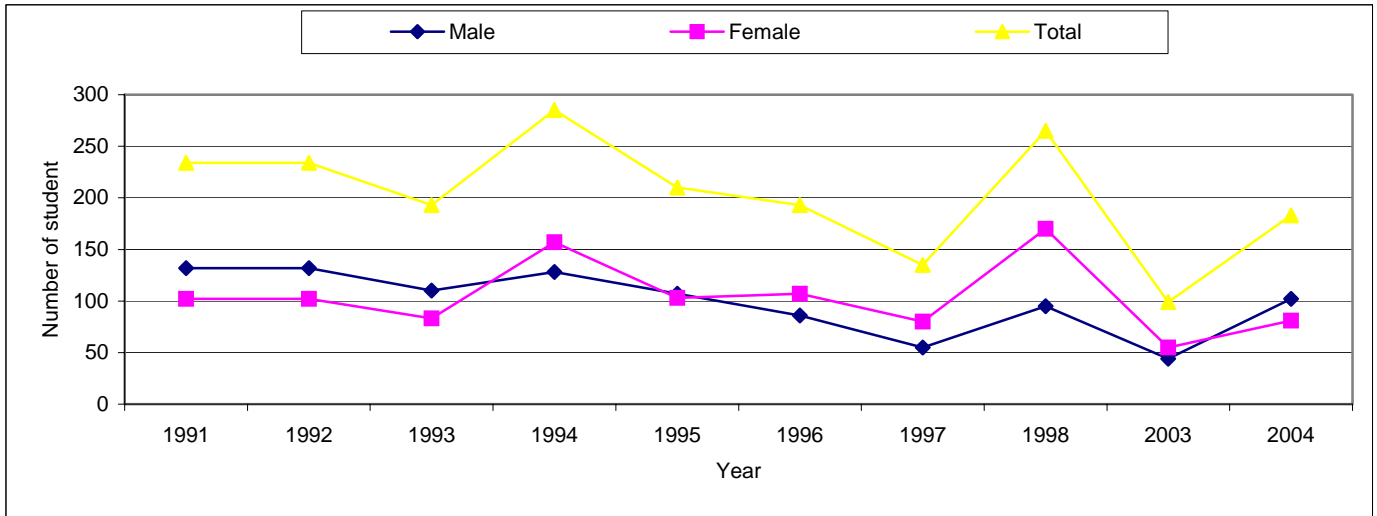
**Fig 7.2 : Motufoua secondary school enrolment by year and sex.**

Figure 7.2 shows a significant decline in the enrolment level at Motufoua Secondary School (MSS) in 1992 and 1993 with a rapid increase following these years. The decline was a result of the discontinued intake of form 1 and 2 by the School as they are accommodated at Primary School level. As for the rapid increase in the enrolment number since 1994 is a direct result of the introduced program called **Education for Life** in which all the students are absorbed into the system without sitting for an entrance exam. There is a significant drop in the enrolment level at MSS in 2002 as most students opted to go to study in Fiji. The Motufoua Entrance Examination was introduced again in 2003, which is obvious in the small number enrolled in the year 2004. (Refer to Table 41).

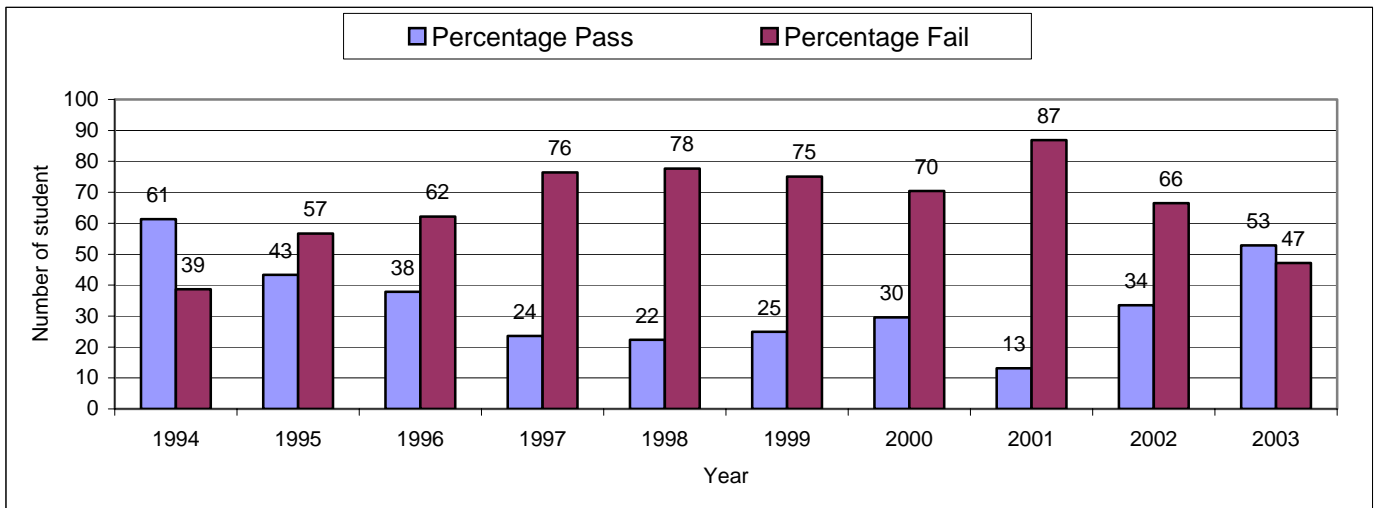
**Figure 7.3: Fetuvalu high school enrolment by year and sex.**

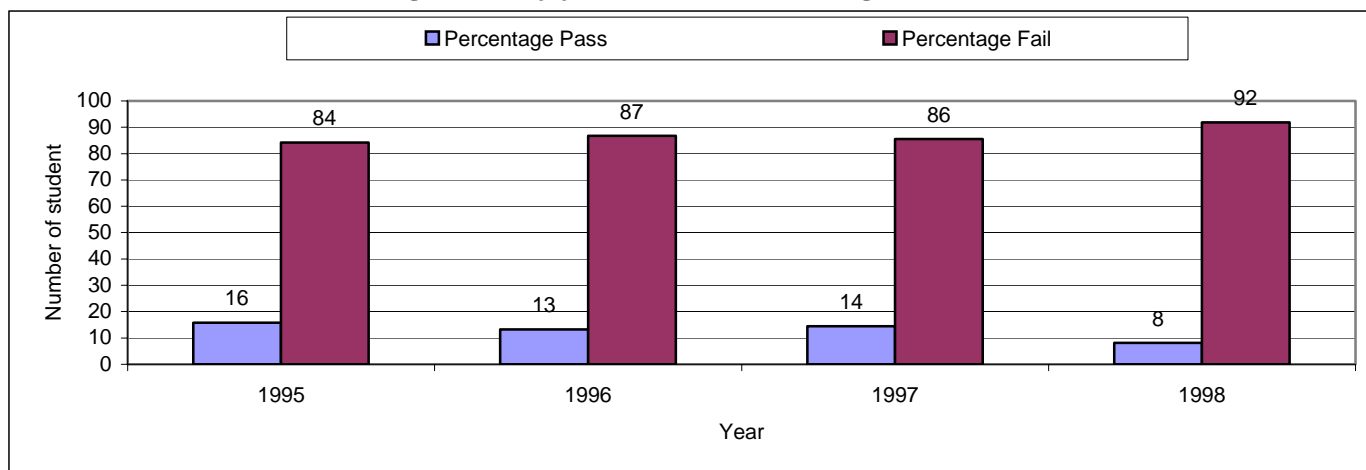
**Figure 7.4: Fiji junior results (Motufoua secondary school)**

**Figure 7.5: Fiji junior results (Fetuvalu high school)**

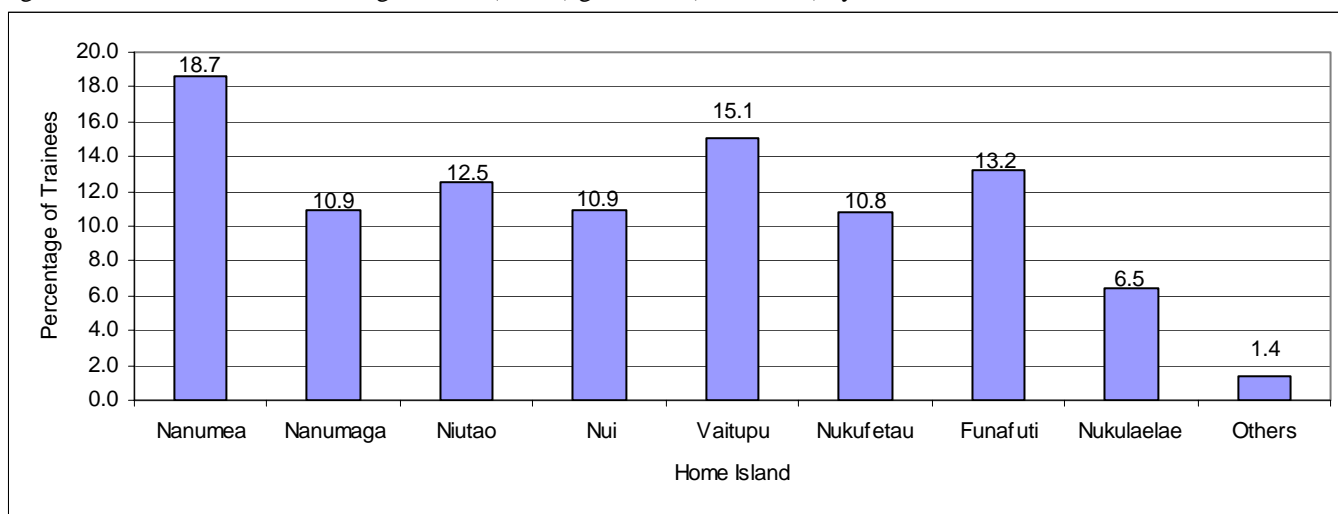

### 7.3 VOCATIONAL

Figure 7.6: Tuvalu maritime training institute (TMTI) graduates (1979-2003) by home islands.



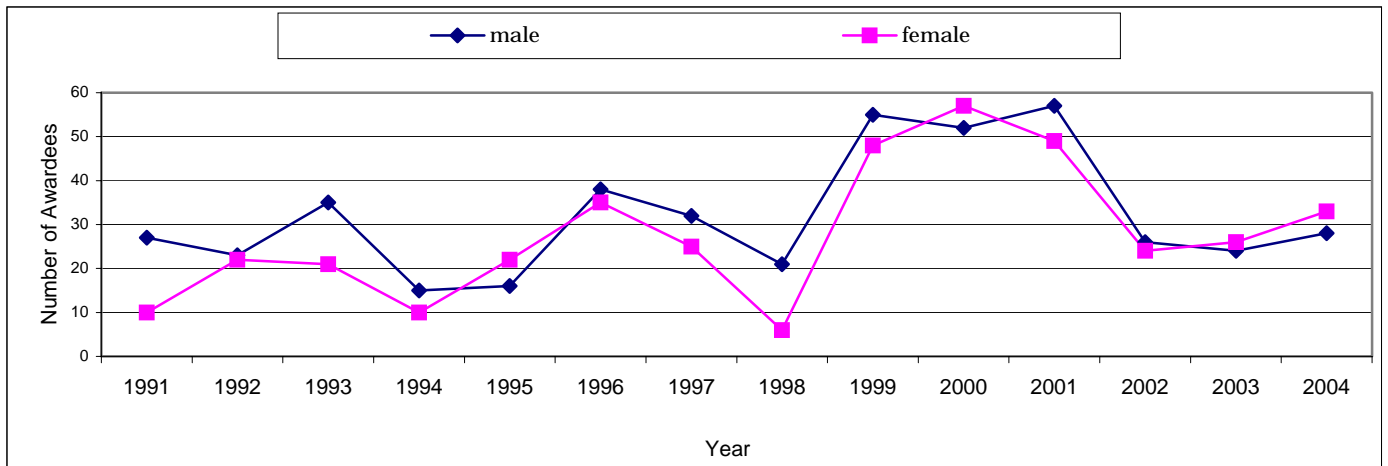

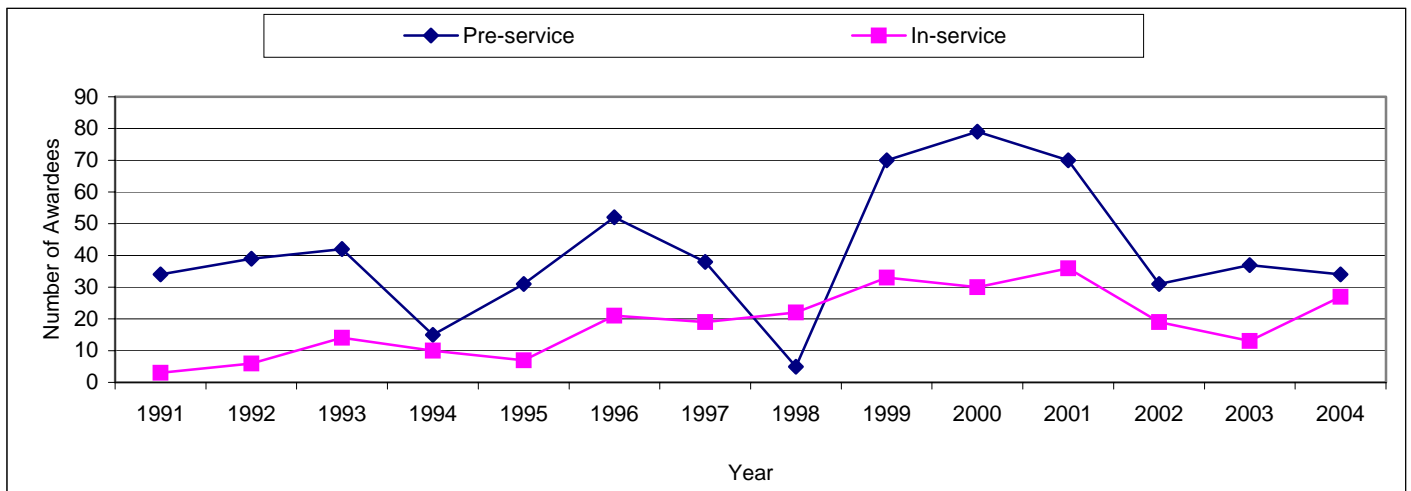
Figure 7.7: Overseas training by year and sex

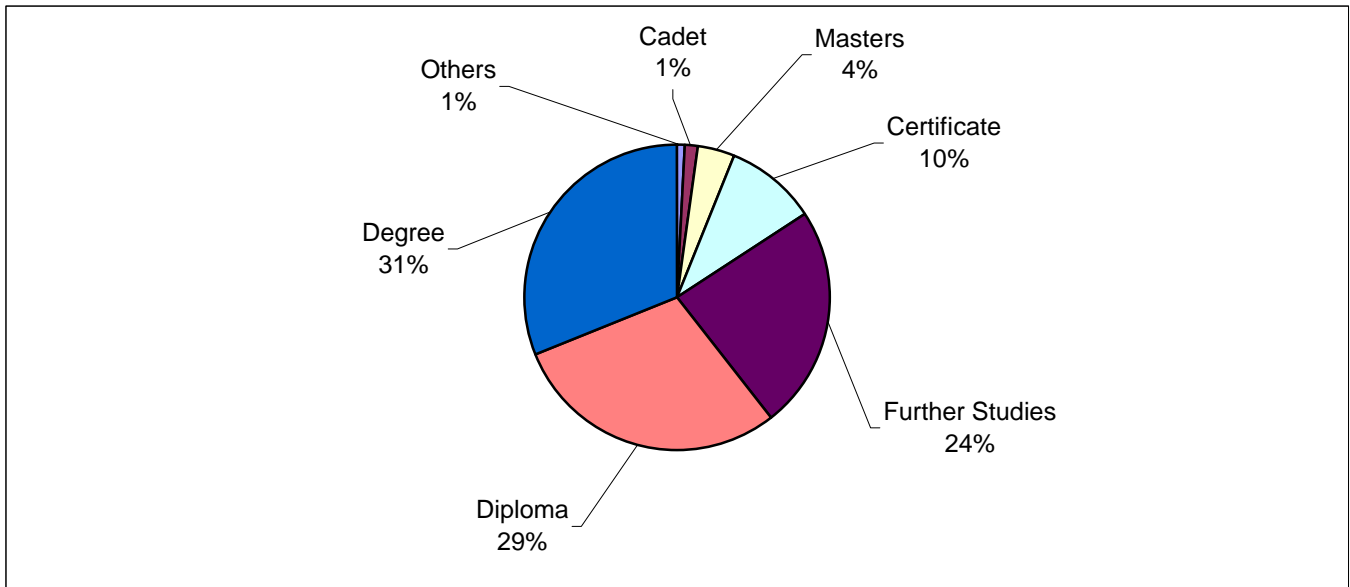
Figure 7.8: In-service and pre-service training by year

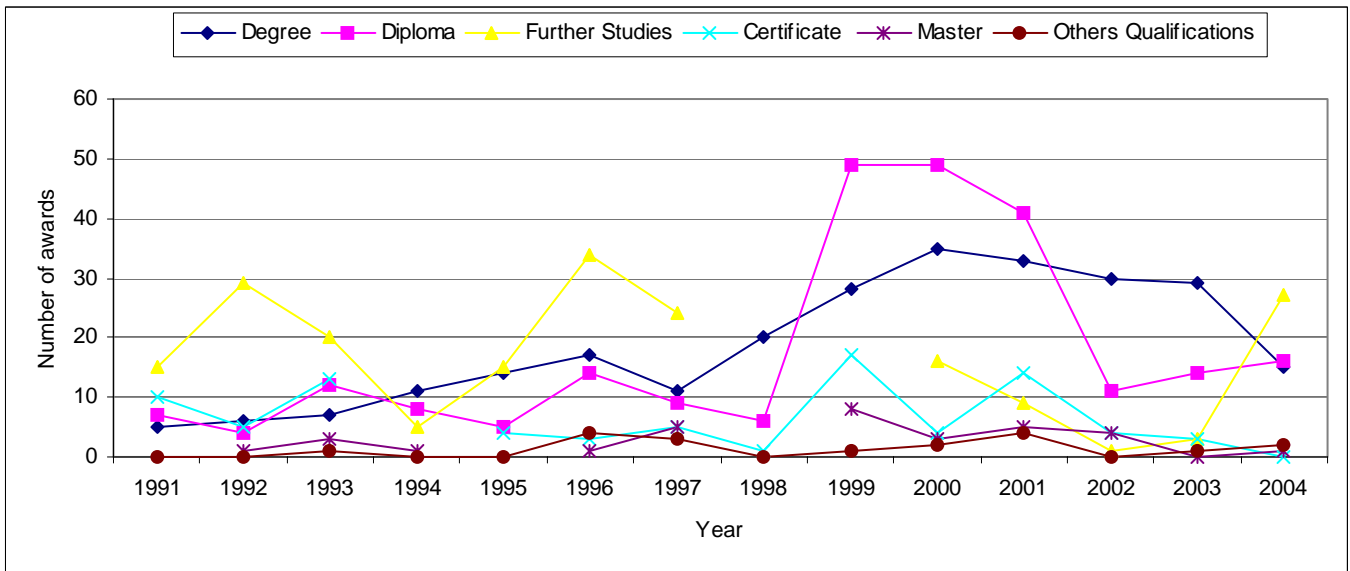
**Figure 7.9: Aggregate overseas training by courses 1991-2004**

Figure 7.9 shows that from 1991-2004, the aggregate total of awards is 837 with the highest proportion of overseas training by courses was dominated by student pursuing degree and diploma courses with 31% and 29% respectively. The number of student on **further studies** are mostly pre-service student with 24% who were actually undertaking form 6 and 7 before taking up their proposed program of studies at tertiary institutions. Other small proportion of overseas training is shared by other courses of studies. (Refer to Table 44).

**Figure 7.10: Total number of overseas training by year**

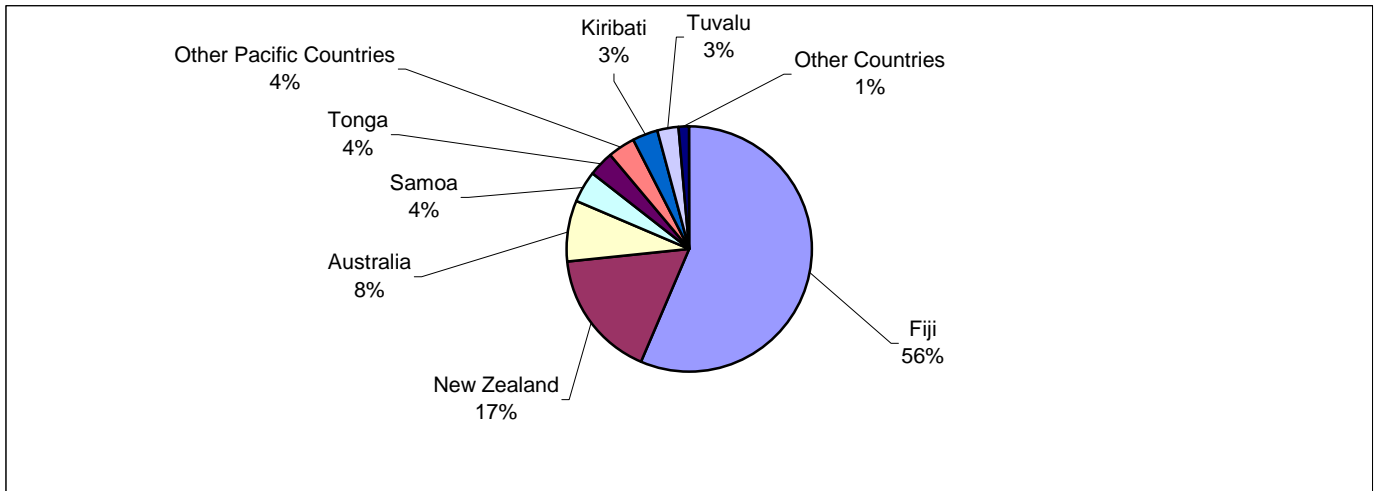

Australia having 17% and 8% respectively. Other Pacific countries shared the smaller proportion with other countries having the least. (Refer to Table 45).

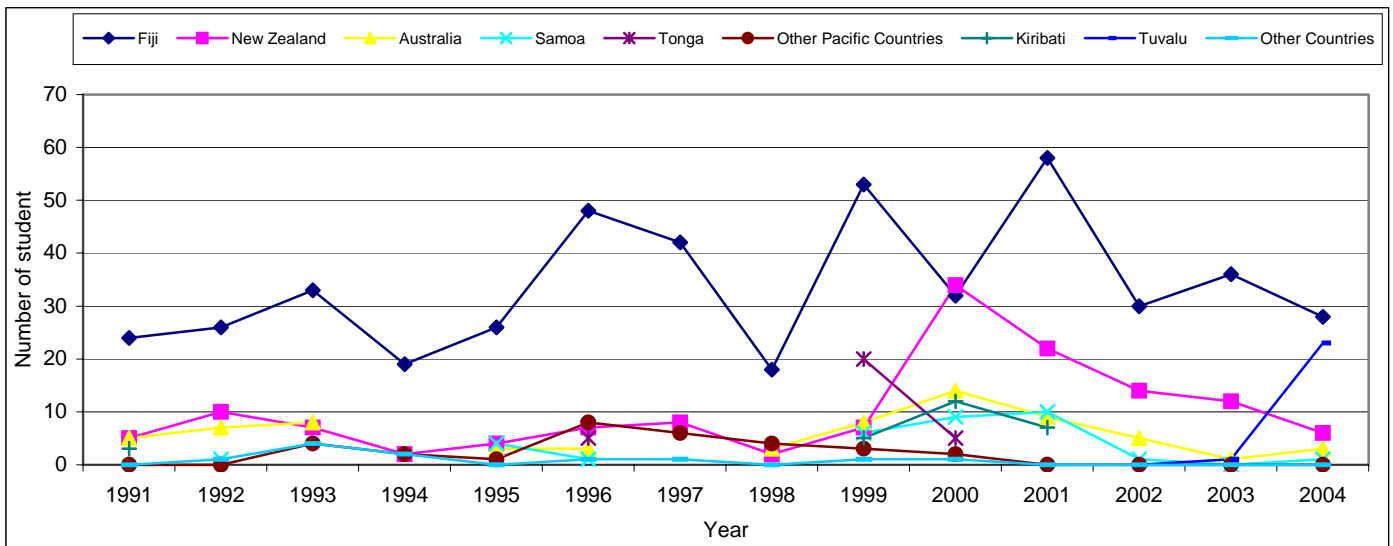
Figure 7.11: Aggregate overseas training by country of study 1991-2004

Figure 7.13: Country of study by year

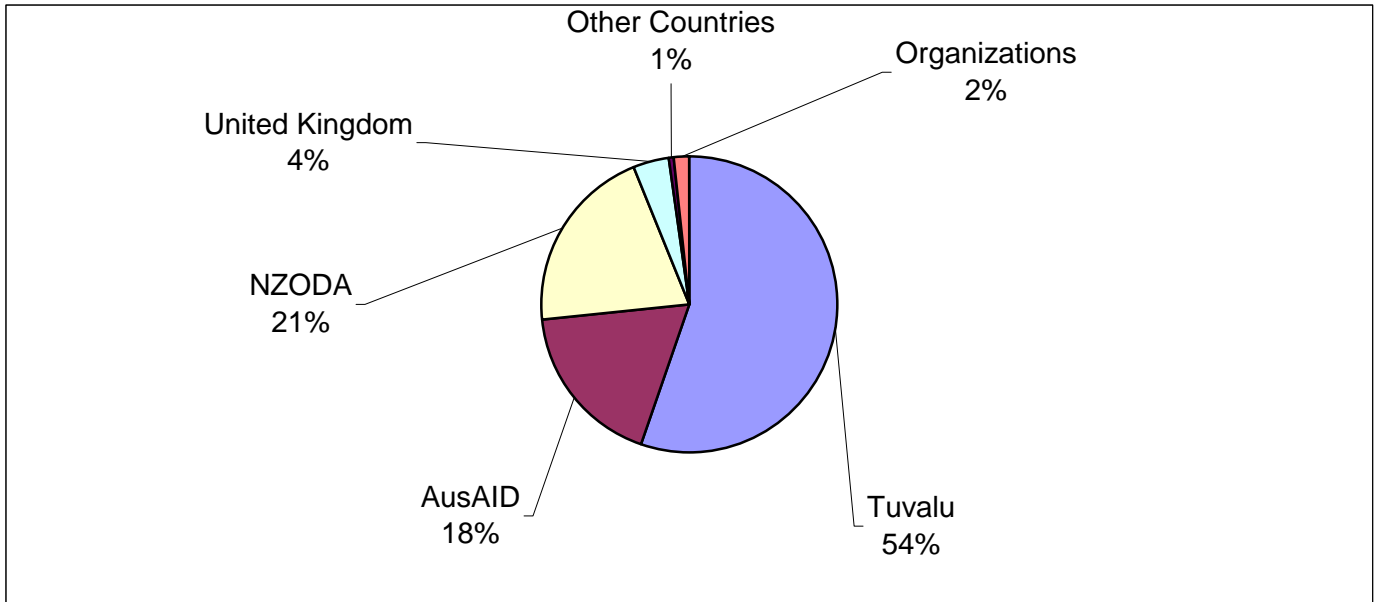

number of overseas training, followed by our traditional sponsors New Zealand and Australia with 21% and 17% respectively. (Refer to Table 46).

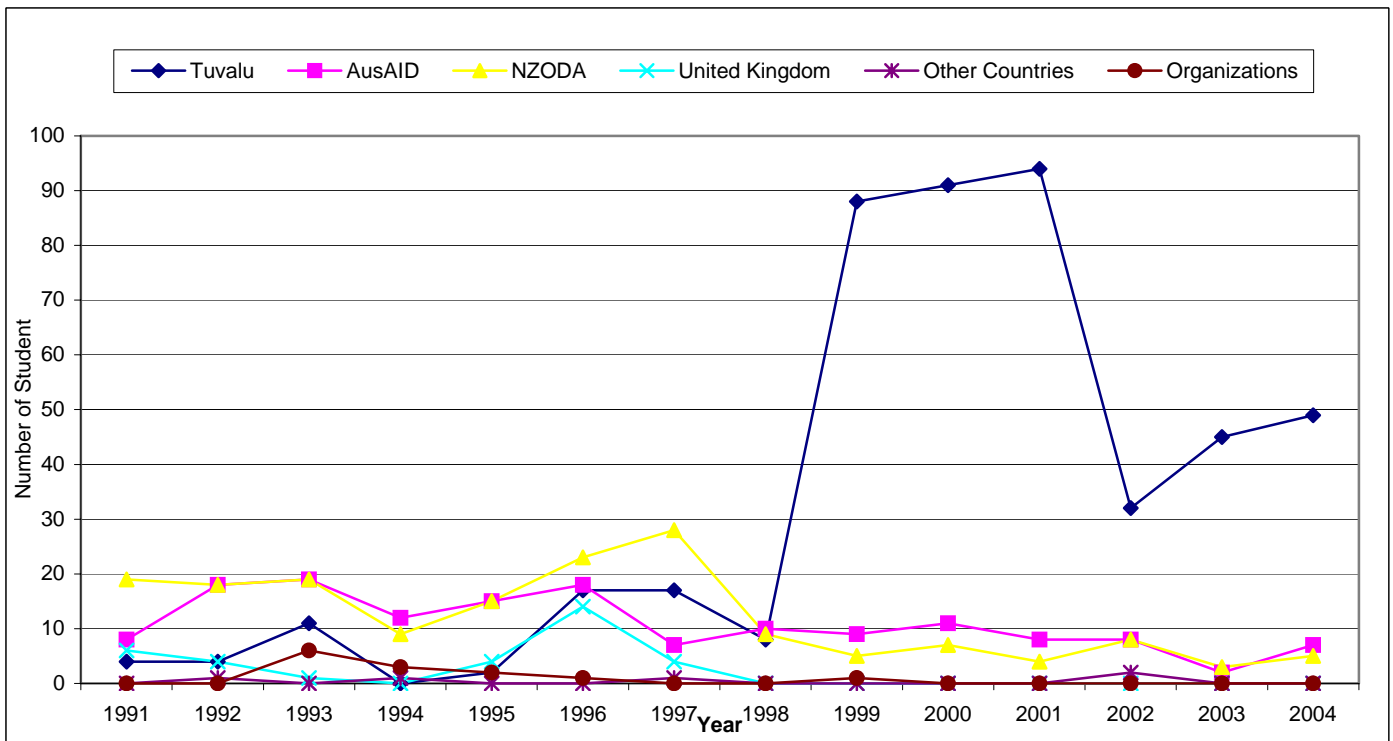
**Figure 7.14: Aggregate overseas training by sponsors 1991-2004**

Figure 7.15: Major sponsors of overseas training by year.

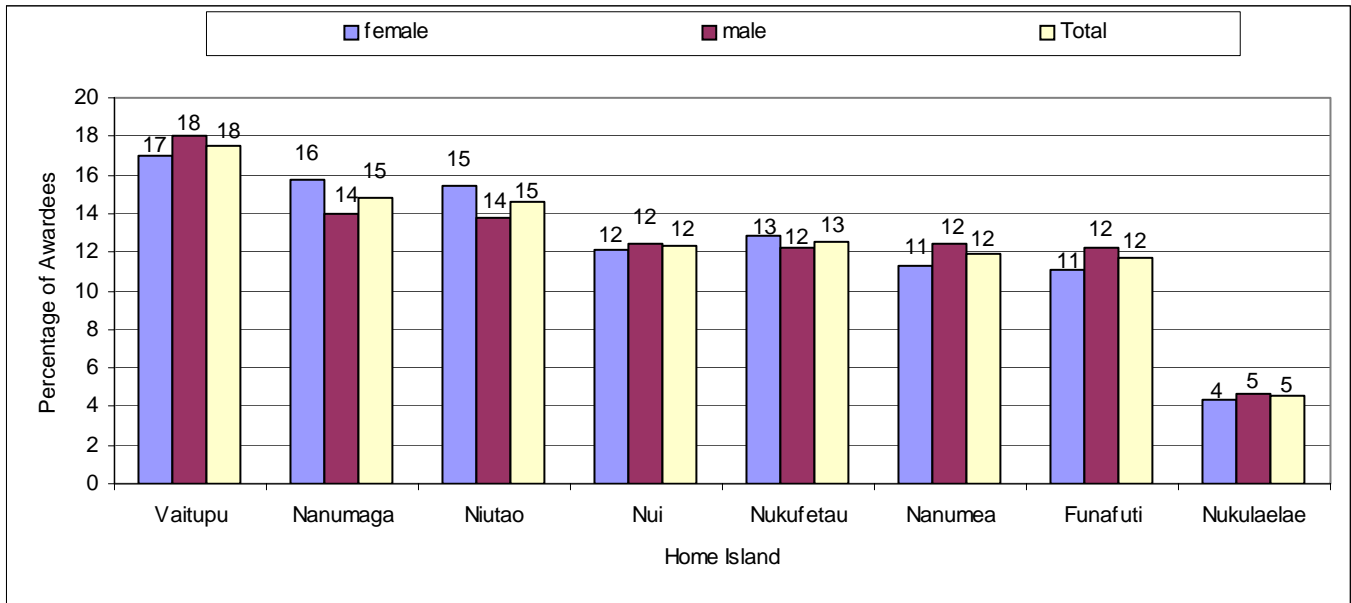

from Nukufetau, 12% from Nanumea and Funafuti and the least from Nukulaelae with only 5%. (Refer to Table 47).

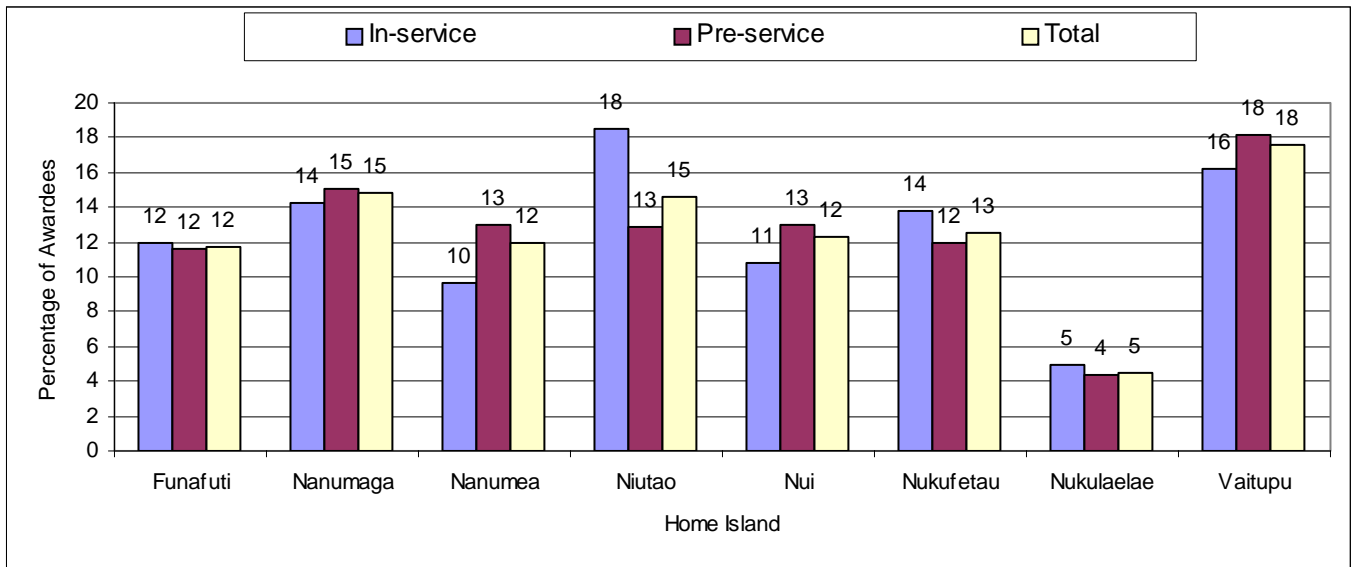
**Figure 7.16: Aggregate overseas training by home island.**

**Figure 7.17: Aggregate pre-service and in-service training by home island**

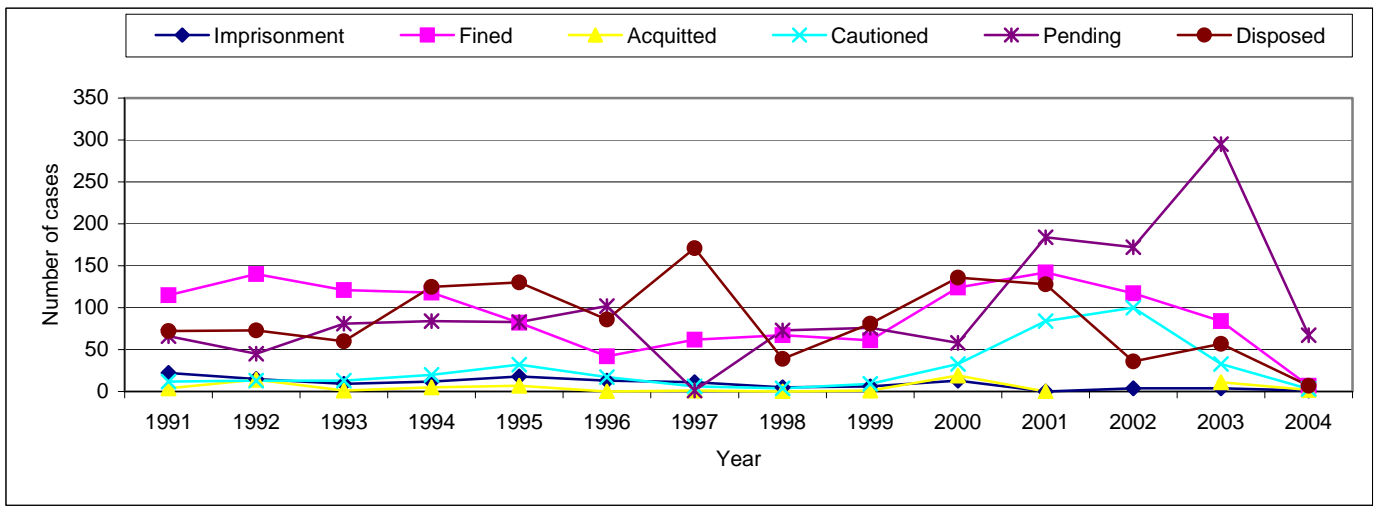

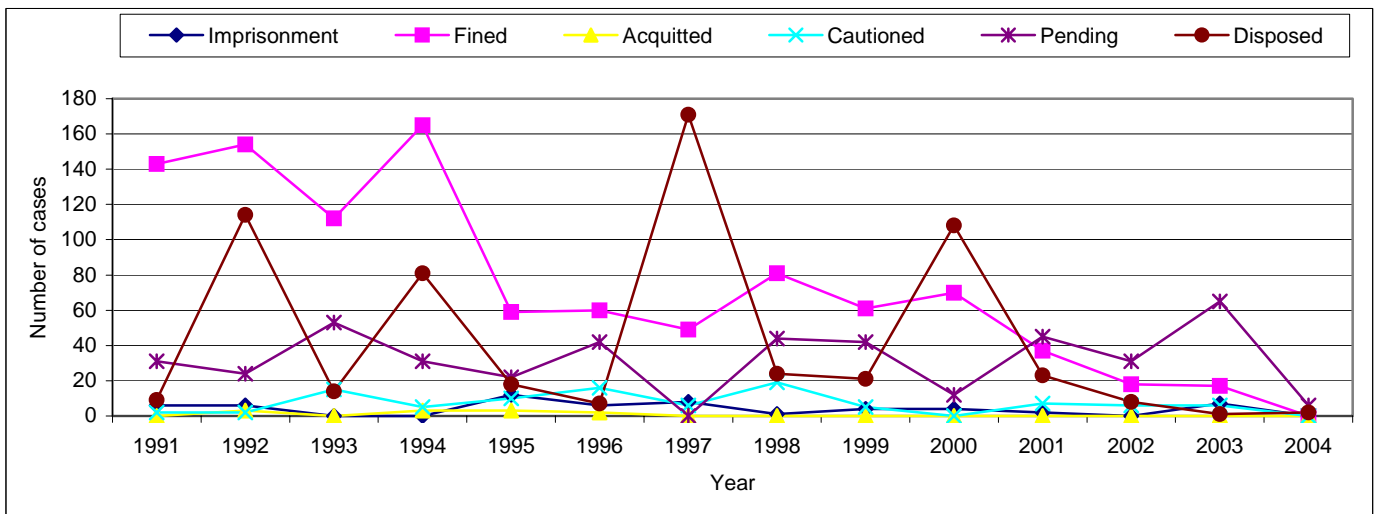

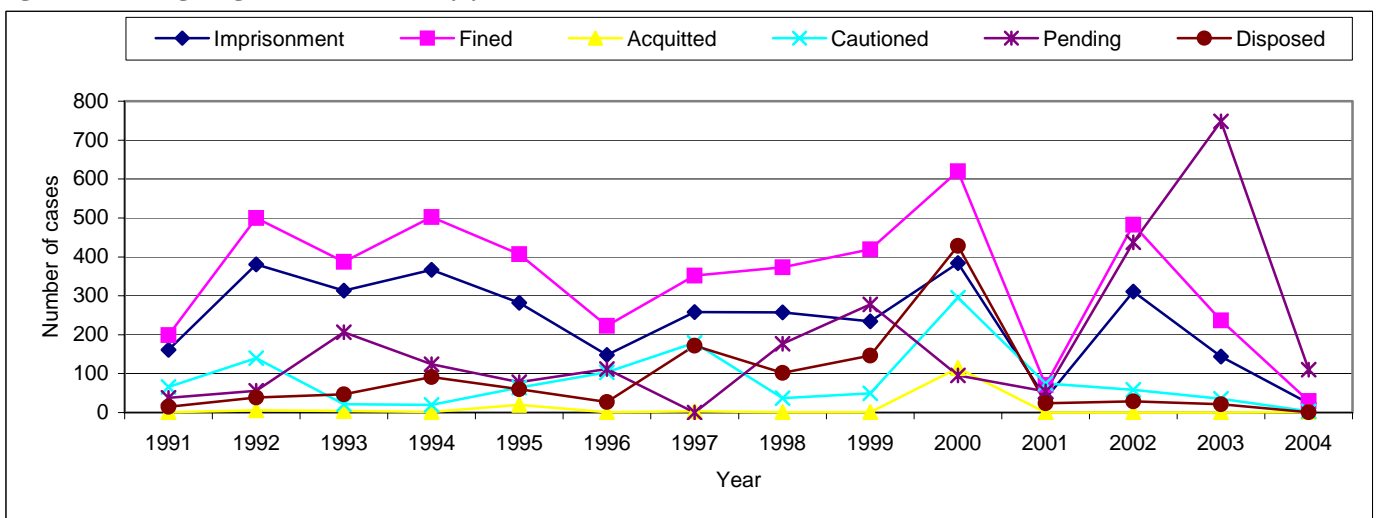
### 8.2 Charges against alcoholic drinking acts by year

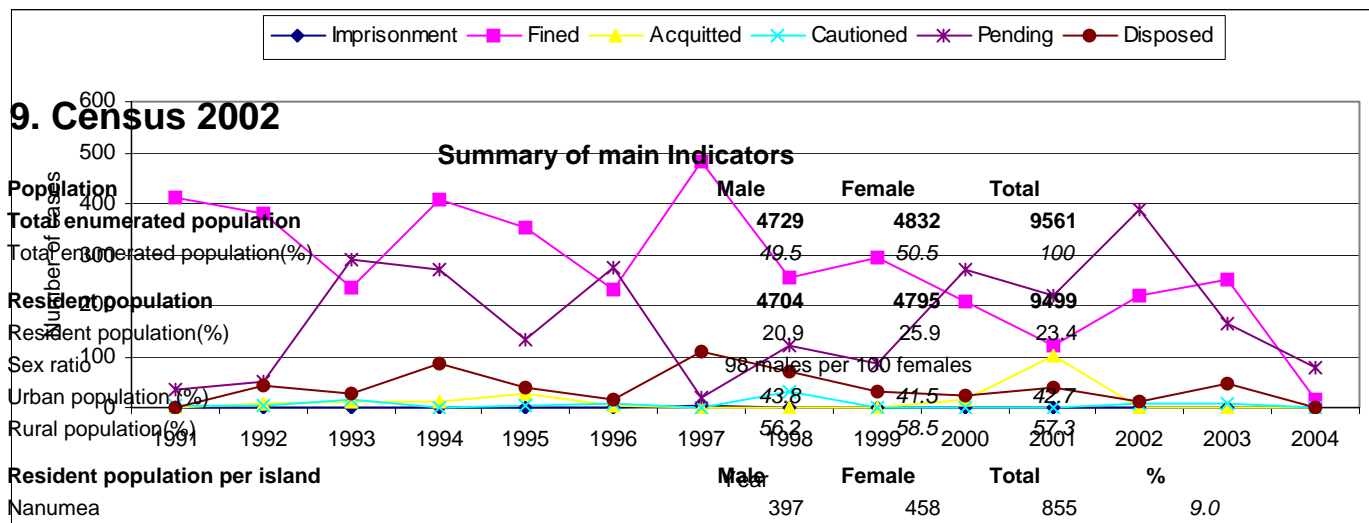
### Figure 8.3 Charges against traffic acts by year

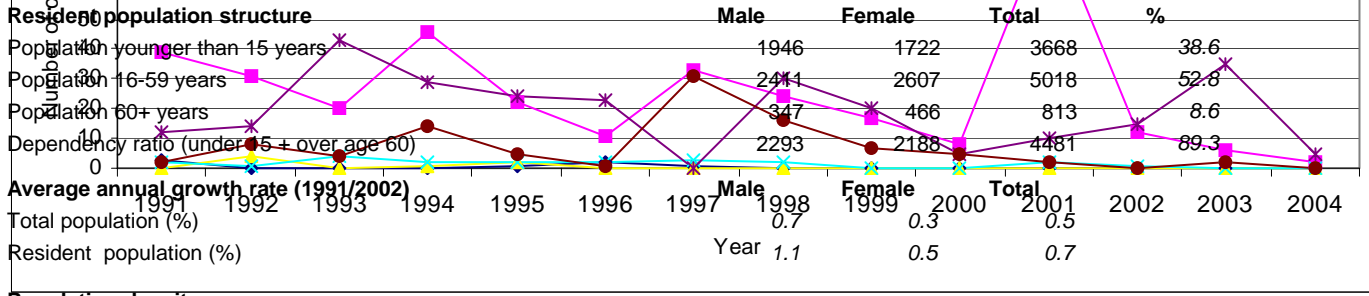
Figure 8.4 Charges against bye-laws by year

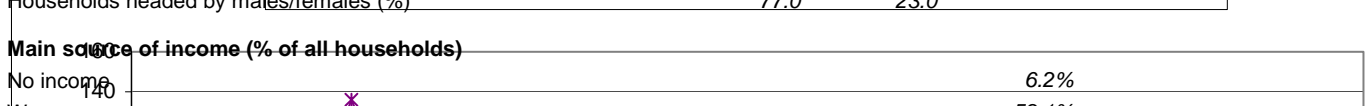

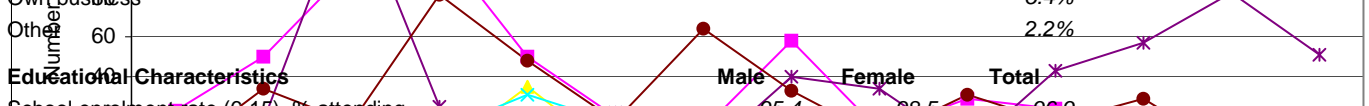

Figure 9.1 Tuvalu census population 1921-2002

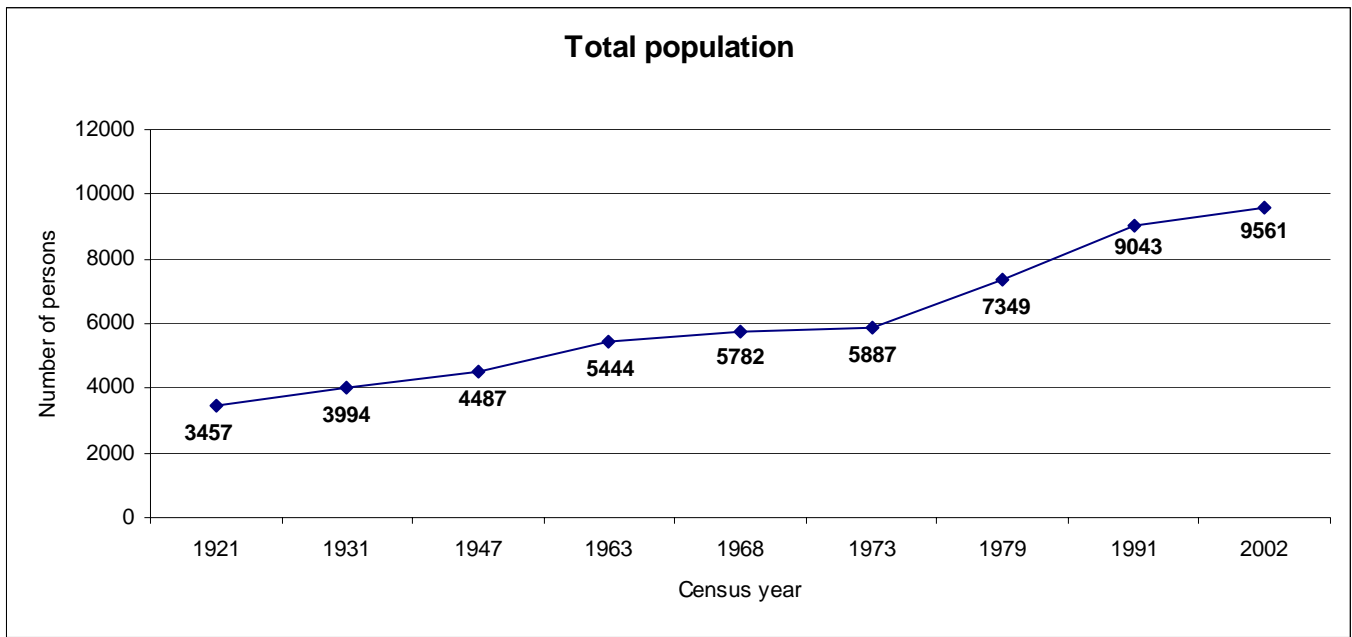

Figure 9.2 Enumerated population by islands, place of enumeration and place of usual residence.

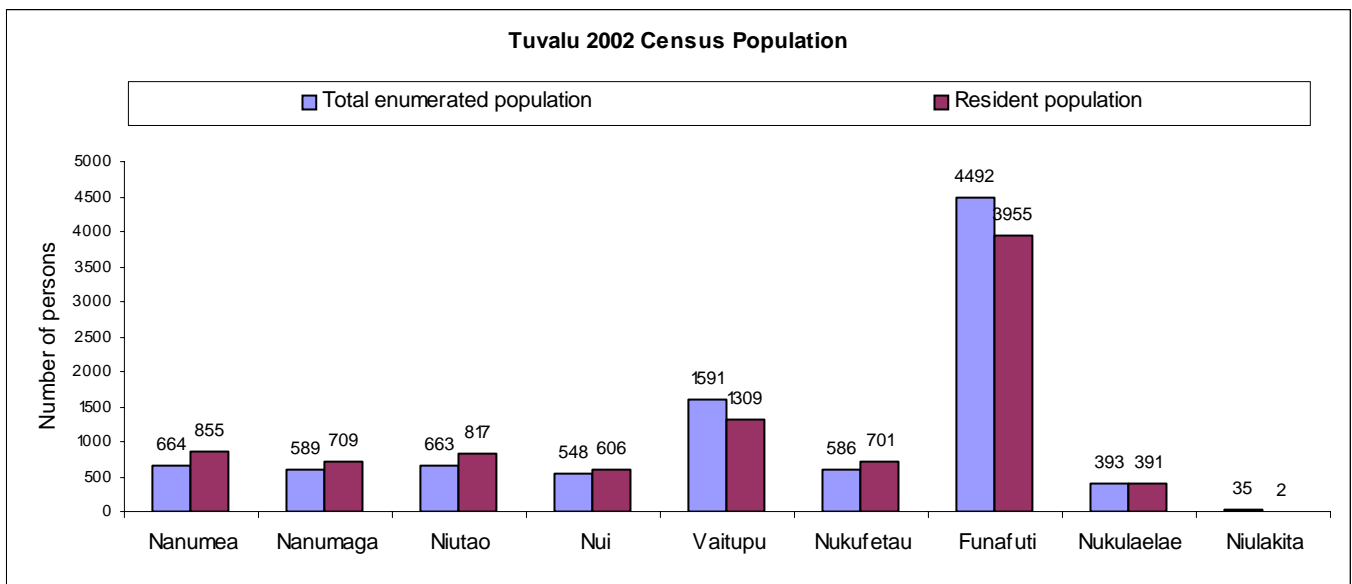

**Figure 9.3 Population pyramid – Resident population**

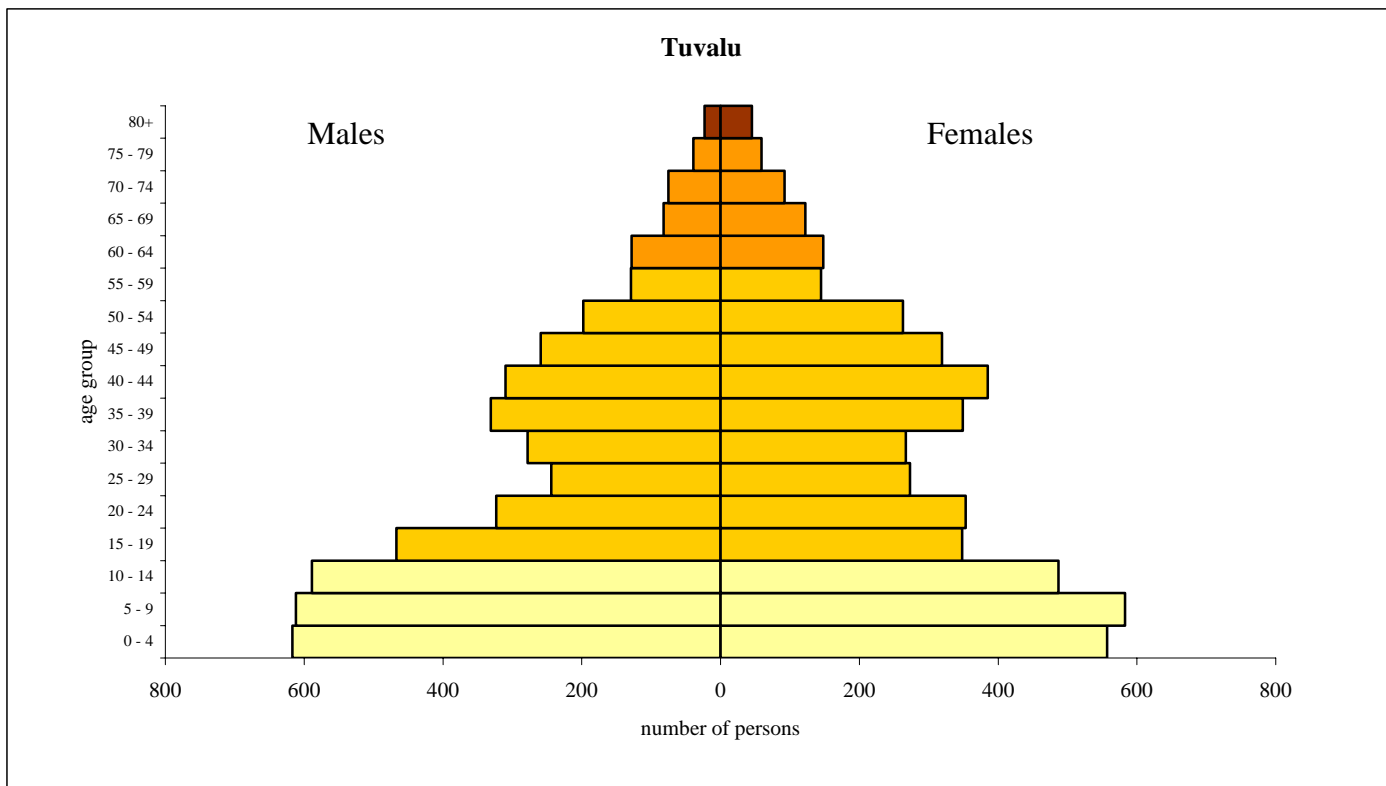
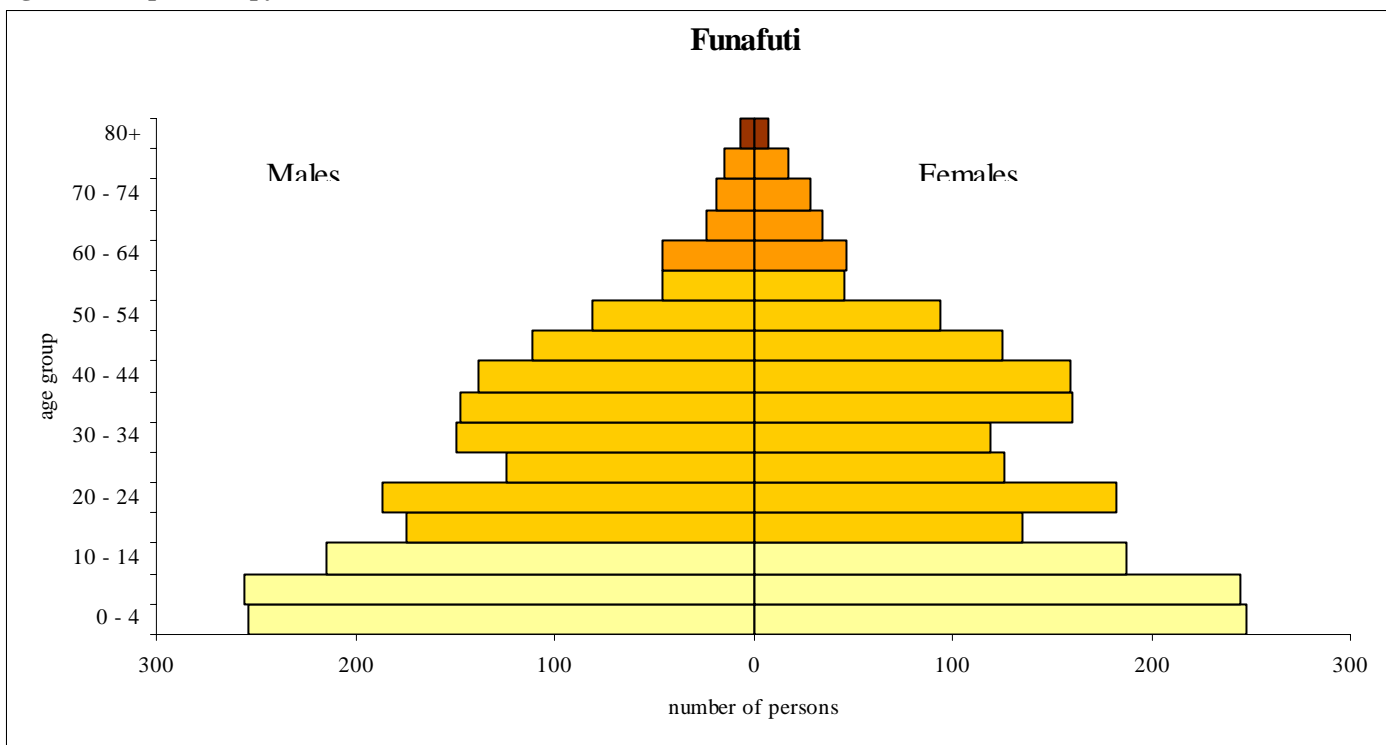

**Figure 9.6 Proportion of resident population aged 6-29 years attending school.**

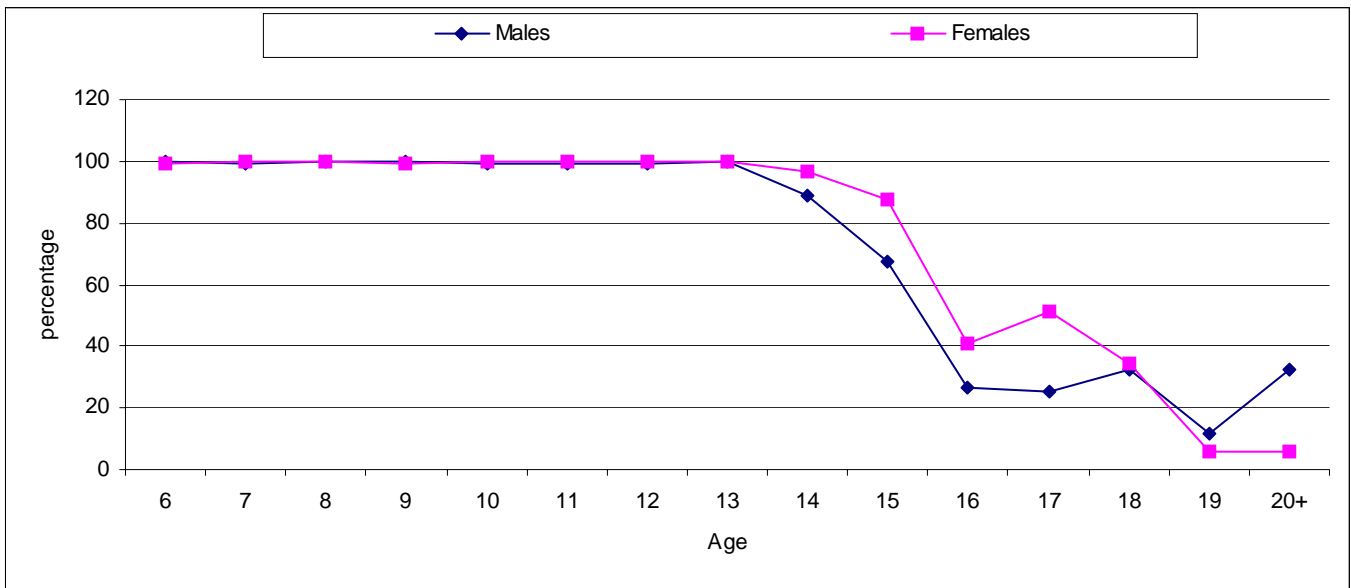

Figure 9.7 Educational attainment, total resident population

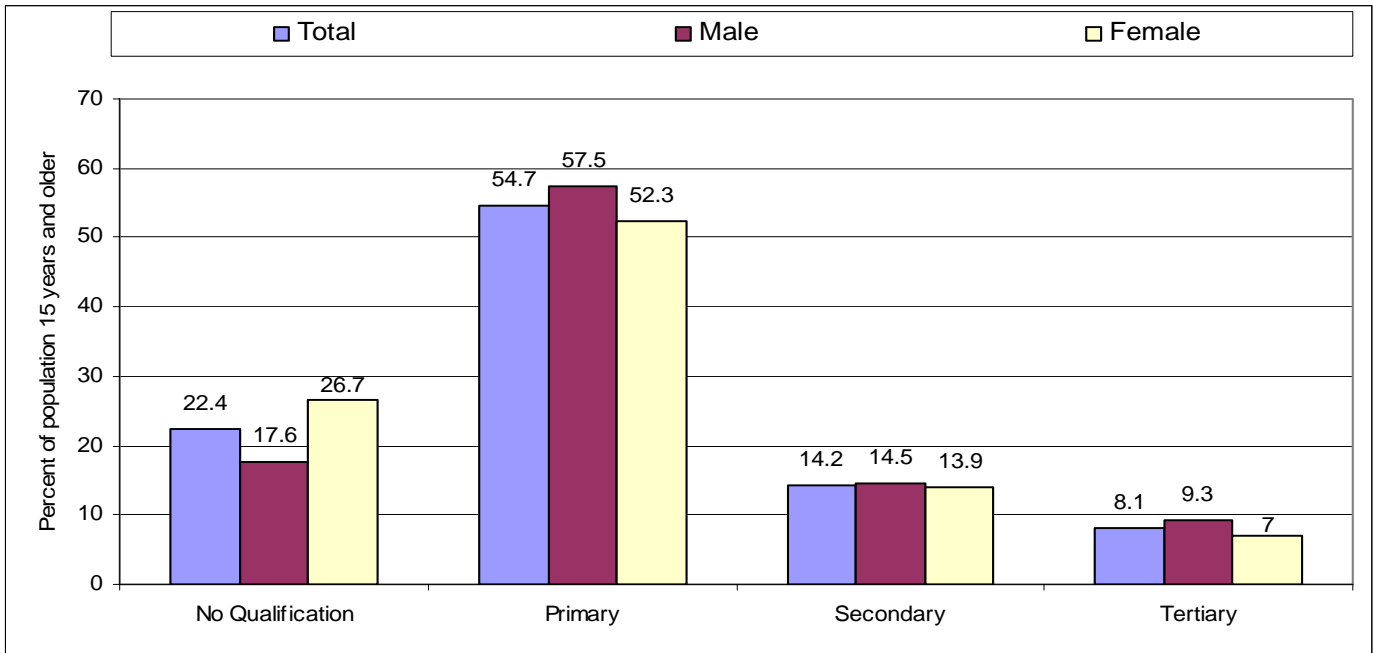


Figure 9.8 presents the proportion of the resident population smoking by 5 year age-group with more male smokes compared to female in all age-group. (Refer to Table 54)

Figure 9.8 Proportion of resident population smoking

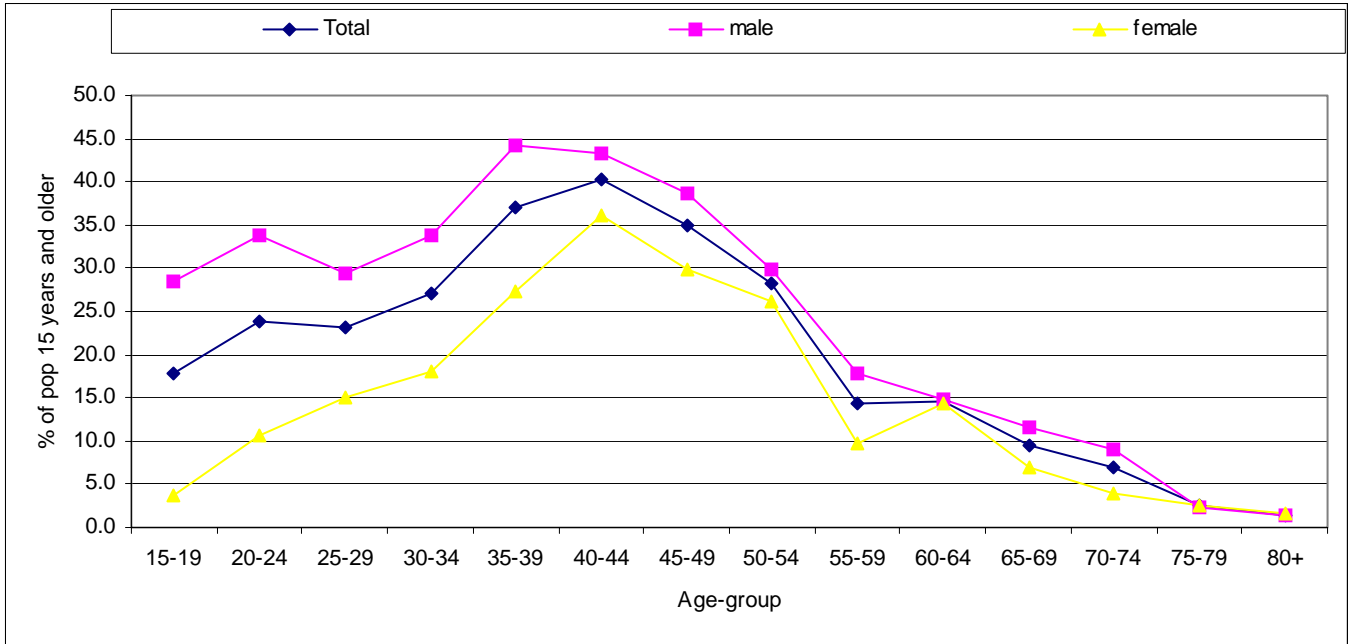

Figure 9.9 Proportion of resident population drinking (taking alcohol)

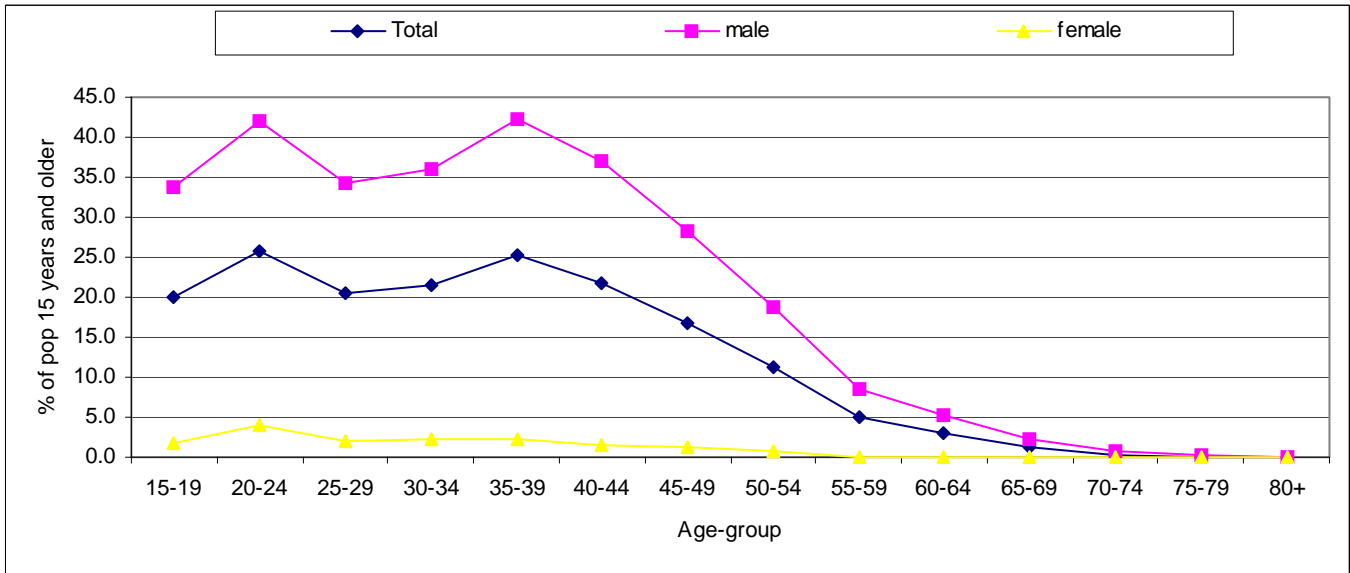


Figure 9.10 shows the average household size by island for the total enumerated population and the resident population as well. (Refer to Table 56)

**Figure 9.10 Average household size by place of enumeration and place of residence**

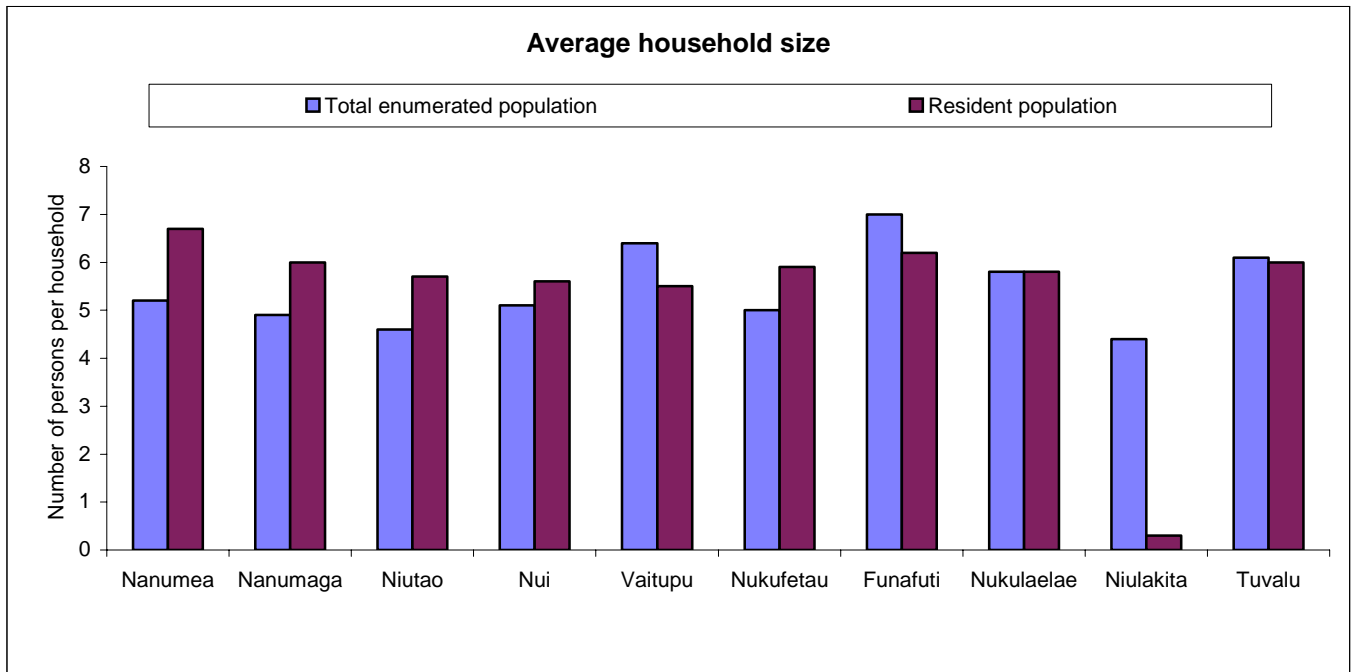


Figure 9.11 presents the main source of income received by private household with much of the income came from wages and remittances with 60% and 18 % respectively. (Refer to Table 57)

**Figure 9.11 private households by main source of income**

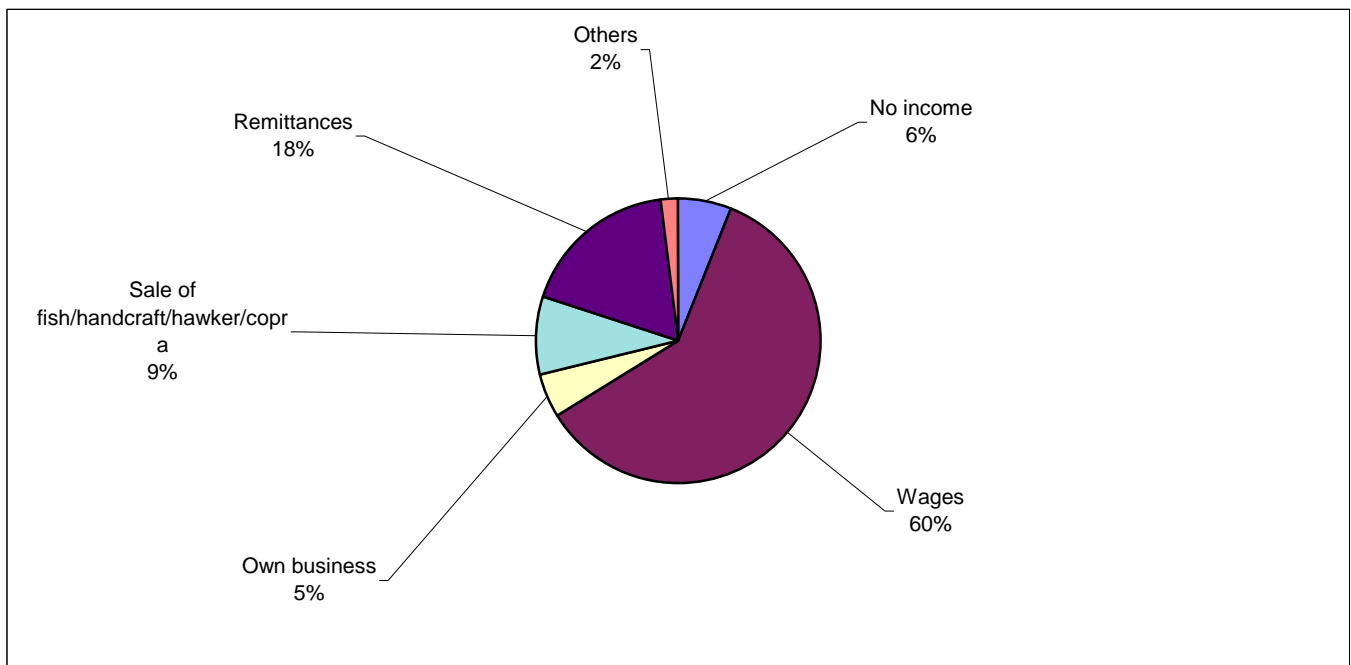

**Figure 9.12 Resident population by home-island**

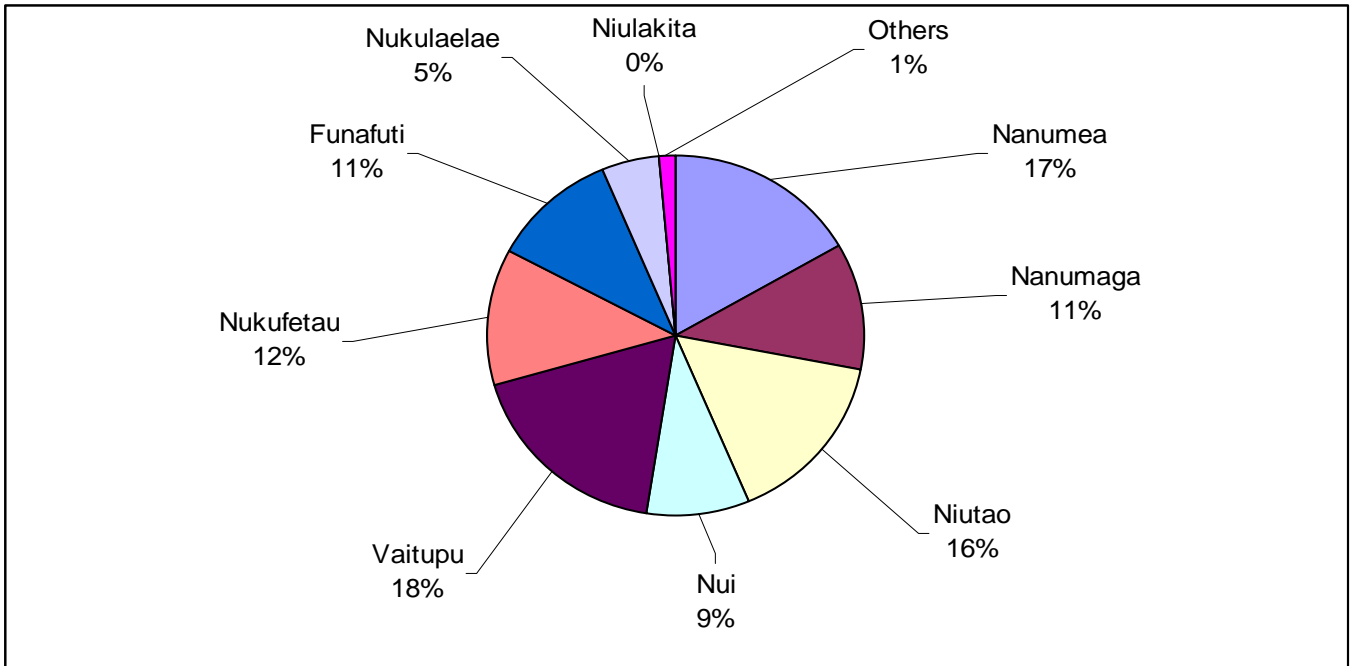
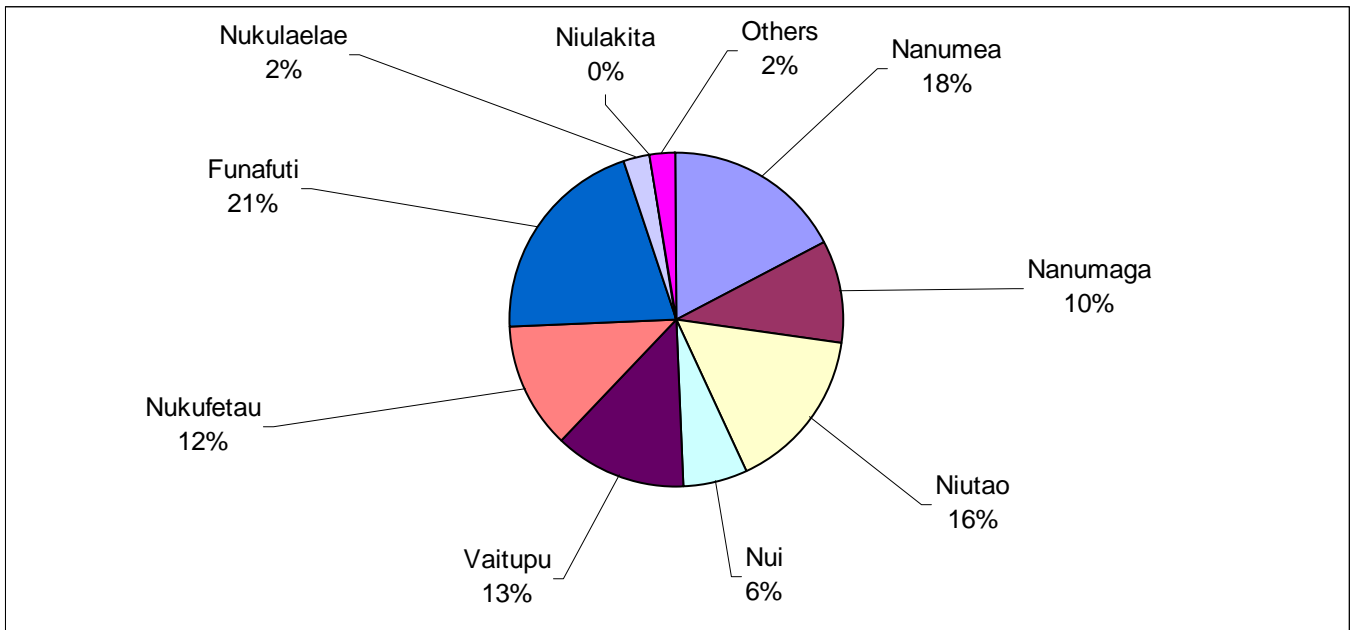


Figure 9.13 presents the total resident population of Funafuti by home-island. (Refer to Table 59)

# TECHNICAL NOTES

1. **Consumers Price Index** - The consumer price index is a measure of the change in the price of goods and services that were purchased. It is calculated by measuring the change in price over time of a range of products purchased and consumed.
2. **Imports** - The value of imports of goods is derived from the Customs documents. The 'CIF' valuation indicates the cost of getting the goods to Tuvalu (freight costs and costs of insuring the goods while in transit) are included whereas the 'FOB' (Free on Board) valuation excludes freight and insurance costs.
3. **National Accounts** – The national accounts is a measure of market and non-market activities in the country. The estimates are derived from records of government, corporations, private sector and local knowledge on households. The GDP (gross domestic product) is referred to as the total production of all the mentioned activities.
4. **Migration** – The migration figures are derived from the immigration cards completed on arrival or departure from Tuvalu. Visitors to Tuvalu are defined as those who are intending to stay in Tuvalu for less than one year. Arrivals who intend to stay in Tuvalu for a year or more are treated as resident arrivals.
5. **Population** – The population figures are derived by adjusting the benchmark population figure of the 2002 Census of Population, for the number of births, deaths and inward and outward migration of residents.
6. **Health** – The health figures are derived from records of the Medical Department.
7. **Education** – The education figure are derived from records the Department of Personnel and Training, Education Department and the Tuvalu Maritime School.
8. **Crime** – The crime figures are derived from records of the Police Department.
9. **Pre-service training** - Are study program awarded to student who have completed either form 5 or 6 at secondary school level and had never been working in the public service.
10. **In-service training** - Refers to study program awarded by the Government of Tuvalu to civil servant, employees of public corporations and organizations from the private sectors.
11. **Enumerated population** - Is the number of people enumerated at a particular place (counted and interviewed) during the 2002 census regardless of their residential status.
12. **Resident population** - Is the number of people who are usual resident of a particular place regardless of their nationality. People from other nationality who have spend more than 12 months in a particular place would be regarded as residents of that particular area.
13. **De-jure population** – The total population including Tuvaluans who are temporary overseas during the census count.
