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Part 1: INTRODUCTION

1.1 About the Pacific Community (SPC)

The Pacific Community (SPC) is the principal scientific and technical organisation of the Pacific region, established by treaty in 1947 with the signing of the Agreement Establishing the South Pacific Commission (the Canberra Agreement).

SPC has our headquarters in Noumea, New Caledonia and has regional offices in Fiji, the Federated States of Micronesia and Vanuatu, as well as an office in France. SPC works across the Pacific and has staff in nearly all of our Pacific Island Country and Territory members.

SPC works for the well-being of Pacific people through the effective and innovative application of science and knowledge and is guided by a deep understanding of Pacific Island contexts and cultures. Our unique organisation covers more than 20 sectors and is renowned for knowledge and innovation in such areas as fisheries science, public health surveillance, geoscience and conservation of plant genetic resources for food security.

1.2 SPC's procurement activities

SPC's procurement activities are guided by the principles of high ethical standards, value for money, open competition and social and environmental responsibility and are carried out under our Procurement Policy.

SPC's *Procurement Policy* provides the framework for ensuring that SPC obtains the best value for its purchases, in terms of both cost and quality; demonstrates financial probity and accountability to its members and development partners; manages and prevents the potential for conflicts of interest; reduces its environmental impact and manages any other risks.

At SPC, all procurement follows the same main steps: planning; statement of needs; requisition; solicitation; evaluation; award; receipt; and payment. Different procedures apply depending on the value of the goods, services and works to be procured.

1.3 SPC's Request for Proposal (RFP) Process

At SPC, procurement valued at more than EUR 45,000 must be advertised through a Request for Proposal (RFP) with any bids received evaluated by SPC's Procurement Committee to determine the offer that provides the best value for money.

This RFP sets out SPC's requirements and it asks you, as a bidder, to respond in writing in a prescribed format with pricing and other required information. The RFP contains detailed instructions and templates to enable you to submit a compliant bid. It sets out the overall timetable; it confirms the evaluation criteria that SPC will use to evaluate proposals; it explains the administrative arrangements for the receipt of the bids; and it sets out how bidders can request further information.

Your participation confirms your acceptance of SPC's conditions of participation in the RFP process.

Part 2: INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS

2.1 Background

SPC invites you to submit a bid to deliver the services as specified in [Part 3](#).

SPC has advertised this RFP on its website and may send it directly to potential vendors. The same specifications, submission and other solicitation requirements will be provided to all vendors.

SPC has compiled these instructions to guide prospective bidders and to ensure that all bidders are given equal and fair consideration.

Please read the instructions carefully before submitting your bid. For your bid to be considered, you must provide all the prescribed information by the closing date and in the format specified.

2.2 Submission instructions

Your submission must be clear, concise and complete and should only include information that is necessary to respond effectively to this RFP. Please note that you may be marked down or excluded from the procurement exercise if your submission contains any ambiguities or lacks clarity.

Your proposal must include the following documents (annexes of [Part 5](#) of the RFP):

- a) Bidder's Letter of Application (**Annex 1**);
- b) Conflict of Interest Declaration (**Annex 2**);
- c) Information about the bidder and Due diligence (**Annex 3**);
- d) Technical proposal submission form (**Annex 4**) with:
 - Cover letter summarising expertise against the selection criteria of the work area(s),
 - Company presentation,
 - Detailed CV(s),
 - Copy of business registration,
 - List of requested amendments to the Preferred Supplier Agreement template, if applicable;
- e) Financial proposal submission form (**Annex 5**), password protected.

Your proposal must be submitted in **two separate emails**.

You must submit your **Technical proposal** (Annexes 1 to 4 and all their supporting documents) in English as an attachment to one email. No financial information may appear in the technical proposal.

You must submit your **Financial proposal** (Annex 5) in a separate email. All prices in the proposal must be presented in EUR. Your Financial proposal is to be password protected. SPC will request the password in the event that it is required.

Both emails are to be sent to procurement@spc.int with the subject line of your email as:

Your proposal must be received no later than **27/11/2024 by 11.45 pm New Caledonia time**.

Only one bid per bidder is permitted.

SPC will send a formal acknowledgement to each proposal received before the deadline.

SPC reserves the right to exclude from consideration any proposal not received by the deadline, with incomplete information or in incorrect form.

2.3 Clarifications

Pre-bid meeting

A virtual pre-bid meeting will be arranged by the SPC Procurement Team on **30/10/2024**. Bidders who are interested to attend the pre-bid meeting must register their attendance through the SPC Procurement email (procurement@spc.int) by **4 pm New Caledonia time on 28/10/2024**.

Clarification requests

You may submit questions or seek clarifications on any issue relating to this RFP. The questions are to be submitted in writing to procurement@spc.int with the subject line:

The deadline for submission of clarifications is **6/11/2024 by 4 pm New Caledonia time**.

Details will be kept of any communications between SPC and bidders. This assists SPC to ensure transparency of the procurement process. While SPC prefers written communication in the RFP process, at any point where there is phone call or other conversation, SPC will keep a record or a file note of the exchange with prospective bidders.

2.4 Evaluation

Validity

Each proposal will be assessed for compliance with the submission requirements by the Bids Opening Committee. At this stage, basic due diligence will also be undertaken.

To assist in the examination, evaluation and comparison of proposals, SPC may ask the bidder for clarification of its proposal or additional information. The request for clarification will be in writing.

Technical

All valid proposals will be assessed against the technical evaluation criteria set out in **Part 4: PROPOSAL EVALUATION MATRIX**. The criteria are provided with weighted scores according to the relative importance of each. SPC will not change the evaluation criteria set out in the RFP at any stage of the procurement process. Any changes in the evaluation criteria will result in the RFP process being re-issued.

Bidders are expected to familiarise themselves with local conditions and take these into account in preparing their proposal. Where minimum qualifications are set as specific evaluation criteria (which may include educational qualification, professional accreditation or certification, licensing, experience and expertise), proposals submitted must necessarily meet these criteria.

Financial

Any bids that pass the minimum technical evaluation requirements will pass onto financial evaluation.

During the financial evaluation, if there is a discrepancy between the unit price and the total price, the lower price shall prevail. If there is a discrepancy between words and figures the amount in words will prevail.

The total cost of the proposal must be submitted inclusive of taxes in accordance with the applicable legislation, and is not subject to revision.

2.5 Contract award

The purpose of this RFP is to implement Preferred Supplier Agreements (PSAs) based on work areas. The PSA template is attached to this RFP.

PSAs are established for an initial period of one (1) year and may be renewed for a period not exceeding three (3) years, depending on the results and quality of the services provided.

SPC may award the contract once the Procurement Committee has determined that a bidder has met the prescribed requirements and the bidder’s proposal has been determined to be the most responsive to the RFP documents, provide the best value for money and best serve the interests of SPC.

SPC’s [General Terms and Conditions of Contract](#) will apply to any contracts awarded under this RFP, unless otherwise agreed. **Any requested changes to the General Terms and Conditions of Contract and/or the contractual clauses of the PSA must be foreshadowed in the submission and attached to the Technical Proposal.**

In the absence of requests for changes, the General Terms and Conditions of Contract and the terms of the PSA shall be deemed to be known, understood and accepted by the bidder.

The award of the contract will be made by contract signed and dated by both parties.

2.6 Key dates

2.7 Legal and compliance

Child and vulnerable adult protection: SPC is committed to the well-being of children and vulnerable adults. All SPC contractors are required to commit to the principles of SPC’s Child and Vulnerable Adult Protection Policy ([XI.G Manual of Staff Policies](#)). Breach of this requirement can result in SPC terminating any contract with a successful bidder. Any allegations of potential misconduct in relation to this RFP involving children or vulnerable adults should be sent to complaints@spc.int.

Confidentiality: Unless otherwise agreed by SPC in advance or where the contents of the RFP are already in the public domain when **shared** with the bidder, bidders shall at all times treat the contents of the RFP and any related documents as confidential. SPC will also treat the information it receives from the bidders as confidential.

Conflict of interest: Bidders must take all necessary measures to prevent any situation of conflict of interest. You must notify SPC in writing as soon as possible of any situation that could constitute a conflict of interest during the RFP process. If you have any familial connection with SPC staff, this must be declared, and approval will then be sought for you to engage in the RFP process. Breach of this requirement can result in the exclusion of the bidder from the RFP process or in SPC terminating any contract with a successful bidder.

Cost of preparation of proposals: Under no circumstances will SPC be liable for any proposal submission costs, expenditure, work or effort that you may incur in relation to your provision of a proposal (including if the procurement process is terminated or amended by SPC).

Currency, validity, duties, taxes: Unless specifically otherwise requested, all proposals should be in EUR and must be net of any direct or indirect taxes and duties and shall remain valid for 120 days from the closing date. The successful bidder is bound by their proposal for a further 60 days following notification they are the preferred bidder so that the contract may be awarded. No price variation due to escalation, inflation, fluctuation in exchange rates, or any other market factors shall be accepted at any time during this period.

Eligibility: Bidders are required to disclose to SPC whether they are subject to any sanction or temporary suspension imposed by any international organisation, or whether they are subject to bankruptcy proceedings. You may not be bankrupt or suspended, debarred, or otherwise identified as ineligible by any international organisation. Failure to disclose such information may result in debarment and termination of any contract issued to the bidder by SPC.

Fraud and corruption: SPC has zero tolerance for fraud and corruption. All contractors have an obligation to report potential fraud and corruption. Breach of this requirement can result in the exclusion of the bidder from the RFP process or in SPC terminating any contract with a successful bidder. Allegations of potential misconduct by an SPC staff member or contractor involving fraud or corruption can be sent to complaints@spc.int.

Good faith: The information in this RFP is provided by SPC in good faith. No representation, warranty, assurance or undertaking (express or implied) is or will be made, and no responsibility or liability will be accepted by SPC in relation to the adequacy, accuracy, completeness or reasonableness of this RFP or any information provided by SPC in relation to this RFP.

Modifications: Any clarifications, corrections or modifications will be published on the SPC website prior to deadline. In the event a bidder has submitted a bid before the clarification, correction or modification, the bidder will be informed and may modify the bid. The modified bid will still need to be received before the deadline.

No offer of contract or invitation to contract: This RFP is not an offer to contract or an invitation by SPC to enter into a contract with you.

Privacy: The bidder is to comply with the requirements of applicable legislation and regulatory requirements in force for the use of personal data that is disclosed for the purposes of this RFP. SPC will handle any personal information it receives under the RFP in line with its [Privacy Policy](#), and the [Guidelines for handling personal information of bidders and grantees](#).

Right to amend, seek clarity, withdraw, not award: SPC reserves the right to: (1) amend, add to or withdraw all or any part of this RFP at any time, or to re-invite bids on the same or any alternative basis; (2) seek clarification or documents in respect of any bidder's submission; (3) choose not to award a contract as a result of this RFP; (4) make whatever changes it sees fit to the timetable, structure or content of the procurement process, depending on approvals processes or for any other reason. Please note that while SPC will not change the evaluation criteria set out in the RFP without the RFP process being re-issued, SPC does reserve the right at the time of award of contract to vary the quantity of services and goods specified in the RFP and to accept or reject any proposal at any time prior to award of the contract without incurring any liability to the affected bidder or any obligation to inform the affected bidder/s of the grounds for SPC's action.

Right to disqualify: SPC reserves the right to disqualify: (1) any bidder that does not submit a proposal in accordance with the instructions in this RFP; (2) any bidder that misrepresents information to SPC; (3) any bidder that directly or indirectly canvasses any SPC employee concerning the award of a contract.

Use of material: Bidders shall not use the contents of the RFP or any related material for any purpose other than for the purpose of considering submitting, or submitting, a bid to SPC.

Warranty, representation, assurance, undertaking: The bidder acknowledges and agrees that no person has any authority to give any warranty, representation, assurance or undertaking on behalf of SPC in connection with any contract which may (or may not) follow on from this RFP process.

2.8 Complaints process

Bidders that consider they were not treated fairly during any SPC procurement process may lodge a protest. The protest should be addressed to complaints@spc.int. The bidder must provide the following information: (1) full contact details; (2) details of the relevant procurement; (3) reasons for the protest, including how the alleged behaviour negatively impacted the bidder; (4) copies of any documents supporting grounds for protest; (5) the relief that is sought.

Part 3: Terms of Reference

A. Background / Context

SPC

The Pacific Community (SPC) is the principal scientific and technical organisation supporting development in the Pacific region. It is an international organisation established by treaty (the Canberra Agreement) in 1947 and is owned and governed by its 26 members including all 22 Pacific Island countries and territories (PICTs).

Through its secretariat, the Pacific Community has been providing the Pacific Islands region with essential scientific and technical advice and services. To achieve genuine and lasting improvement in people's lives, its focus is on working with all members, at all levels, to deliver integrated services that advance their progress towards addressing their development challenges and achieving their aspirations.

FAME

The SPC Division of Fisheries, Aquaculture and Marine Ecosystems (FAME) provides specialist expertise and technical assistance to support fisheries management and sustainable development in the Pacific.

Partnering with all 22 PICTs and both regional, sub-regional and national entities working in the marine sector, FAME's goal is to ensure fisheries and aquaculture resources of the Pacific region are resilient, and sustainably managed for economic growth, food security and cultural and environmental conservation.

FAME is composed of two programmes: the Oceanic Fisheries Programme (OFP) and the Coastal Fisheries and Aquaculture Programme (CFAP).

OFP functions as the Pacific Community's regional centre for tuna fisheries research, fishery monitoring, stock assessment and data management. OFP has three sections: Stock Assessment and Modelling (SAM), Data Management (DM) and Fisheries and Ecosystem Monitoring and Analysis (FEMA).

CFAP provides coastal fisheries and aquaculture science and management advice to members to realise sustainable and equitable use of coastal fisheries and aquaculture resources for social and economic wellbeing of the Pacific people. CFAP has three sections: Aquaculture, Coastal Fisheries Management and Livelihood (CML) and Coastal Fisheries and Aquaculture Science.

OFP and CFAP support and implement all seven of the FAME Business Plan objectives:

Objective 1 – Enhance strategic oversight, efficient operational systems, partnership, and collaboration with other SPC divisions, our members, and partners.

Objective 2 – Provide, and facilitate access to and interpretation of fisheries, aquaculture, and marine ecosystems information and knowledge.

Objective 3 – Enhance data collection and provide data management services for fisheries, aquaculture, and marine ecosystems.

Objective 4 – Provide scientific research, analysis, and advice for evidence-based fisheries management.

Objective 5 – Strengthen the contributions of Pacific Islands aquaculture and fisheries toward sustainable, biosecure, equitable and more secure food systems.

Objective 6 – Identify diverse and sustainable livelihood options for SPC member PICTs.

Objective 7 – Support the development of national capacity and enhance capabilities in fisheries and aquaculture among PICTs.

The FAME Director's Office incorporates FAME-wide activities including fish information, Monitoring Evaluation and Learning (MEL), planning and communications.

FAME is the region's centre for fisheries science and information, providing essential data collection, data management and modelling and analysis services to the Pacific, including the following work areas:

- The provision of high-quality scientific information and advice on the status of, and fishery impacts on, targeted stocks. This component supports the Western and Central Pacific Fisheries Commission (WCPFC), the Pacific Islands Forum Fisheries Agency (FFA), sub-regional and national fisheries management initiatives, along with national administrations with the best science-based advice.
- The provision of high-quality monitoring services, analysis services and capacity development to support the management of fisheries. This component aims at providing efficient and cost-effective fishery monitoring and analytical services to support Pacific fisheries.
- The provision of high-quality data management services and capacity development to support the management of Pacific fisheries. This component aims at providing efficient and cost-effective data management services to support Pacific fisheries.
- Improve understanding of pelagic and coastal ecosystems in the Western and Central Pacific Ocean (WCPO). This component aims at providing enhanced data on the biological characteristics of coastal and oceanic species and their environment to support stock assessment, ecosystem-based, and community-based fisheries management. This includes providing appropriate ecosystem models and analyses, and providing science-based information and advice on ecosystem issues.

B. Purpose, objectives, scope of services

This RFP aims at identifying individuals or entities interested in providing consultancy services in one or more of the areas of work detailed below.

Work Areas

Preferred service providers could be expected to provide technical services and capabilities within one or more of the following work areas.

1. National and Regional Science Support

- Undertake analyses and interpretation of biological data and fisheries statistics to support the assessment and management decision making on coastal and pelagic fisheries in the Western and Central Pacific Ocean (WCPO).
- Provide scientific support and advice for regional, sub-regional and/or national management initiatives.
- Develop regional medium-term research plans and project concepts for key pelagic fisheries stocks in the WCPO.
- Develop dashboards to display fisheries data.
- Support capacity building activities related to fisheries data analysis and interpretation.
- Conduct stakeholder surveys and project reviews.

2. Stock Assessment

- Conduct or support stock assessments of tuna and tuna like species and pelagic sharks, using a variety of approaches and software (e.g. integrated assessment, risk assessment, data limited methods).

- Conduct analyses and reviews on data used for stock assessments (CPUE standardisation, tagging data, size and age composition).
- Write and present stock assessment work to stakeholders in English.
- Development of stock assessment modelling software.

3. Bycatch Estimation and Analyses

- Undertake analyses using a range of data sources to explore variables that influence capture and mortality rates of target and bycatch stocks, including operational characteristics and spatiotemporal variation.
- Undertake analyses to estimate the impact of management mitigation options on bycatch levels and resulting mortalities.
- Undertake analyses of relevant information, including observer data, to estimate captures and mortalities of bycatch species in the WCPO at a regional and/or sub-regional and/or local level.
- Present and display relevant model outputs in appropriate formats, including through the update and maintenance of suitable websites.

4. Ecosystem Modelling

- Development of “end to end ecosystem” models, such as ECOPATH/ECOSIM, the Spatial Ecosystem and Population Dynamics Model (SEAPODYM), or multi-species models, for use in modelling the ecosystem dynamics of target stocks and related species in the Pacific Ocean.
- Evaluation of fishery- and climate change-related impacts on oceanic and coastal ecosystems, including, but not limited to, estimating the spatial impacts of fishing; estimating interactions among fisheries; estimating the impacts of environmental variability on stock distribution and abundance; and estimating the impacts of climate change on stocks and fisheries.

5. Management Strategy Evaluation (MSE)

- Provide support for Harvest Strategy engagement and capacity building in the Western and Central Pacific and provision of materials to support capacity building and general awareness.
- Provide expert review of MSE modelling frameworks and associated components.
- Development of MSE modelling frameworks and associated components, including operating models, and estimation methods.

6. Drifting Fish Aggregation Devices (dFADs)

- Provide training and coordination of activities for the construction and use of biodegradable and non-entangling drifting FADs.
- Provide liaison and logistical support between fishing industry, national agencies, FAD building companies and SPC in relation to research activities and implementation of biodegradable and non-entangling drifting FADs.
- Support for stranded FAD data collection and surveys, including training and capacity building.

C. Duration of the work

Preferred service providers identified through this process will retain this status for a trial period of one (1) year, and may be called upon within that period, as needed by SPC. If their performance is deemed satisfactory during the trial period, their preferred supplier status can be extended for a period of up to three (3) additional years.

D. Institutional arrangements

The consultant(s) will report to the Director of FAME and/or the Deputy Director of FAME (Oceanic Fisheries Programme) who will be responsible for signing off on the agreed outputs and approving payments. The consultant(s) will be expected to work closely with relevant staff within FAME.

The consultant(s) will have primary responsibility for the completion of documented outputs. The provision of data from SPC (if necessary) will be subject to strict data confidentiality agreements and data provided to the consultant(s) cannot be retained at the end of the contract.

E. Skills and qualifications

Consultant(s) will be identified for preferred service provider status in the areas identified in **Section B** above. The expected skills and qualifications that are required for each work area are outlined below:

1. National and Regional Science Support

- Knowledge and experience working on tuna fisheries management and or science.
- Knowledge of the tuna fisheries in WCPO at the regional and subregional level.
- Demonstrated high level experience in analysis of fisheries data.
- Demonstrated experience at presenting on fisheries related analysis and or management issues to diverse stakeholders, in written (English) and oral forms.
- Demonstrated experience in project development, planning and management.
- Skills in software development and or use of various software tools to develop data dashboards.
- Demonstrated experience in running workshops and meetings, including facilitation and chairing.

2. Stock Assessment

- High level of demonstrated experience in conducting fisheries stock assessments and related fisheries analyses.
- Demonstrated skills and competency in a range of software required to conduct complex integrated stock assessment.
- Experience presenting stock assessments to managers and other fisheries stakeholders, written and oral, in English.
- Skills in computer programming and development of software or codes for fisheries data analyses.
- Strong statistical analysis skills.

3. Bycatch Estimation and Analyses

- Demonstrated experience in analysis of multiple data sources, examples being regional observer data, electronic monitoring data.
- Demonstrated experience in the application of statistical approaches to fishery bycatch data to identify influencing factors and construct historical time series of catch and mortality.
- Demonstrated experience in the statistical evaluation of the impacts of potential management interventions on bycatch levels and resulting mortalities.
- Demonstrated experience in the presentation of relevant outputs, examples including through websites.

4. Ecosystem Modelling

- Demonstrated experience in the development of ecosystem and/or population dynamics models (e.g. Ecopath/Ecosim, SEAPODYM, multi-species).
- Experience in the use of large regional data sets.

- Knowledge of modelling products for generating spatiotemporal estimates of key oceanographic variables that influence the distribution and abundance of fish.
- Knowledge and experience in the use of models to evaluate potential future scenarios.

5. Management Strategy Evaluation (MSE) and Harvest Strategies

- Demonstrated experience in the development and production of outreach and training materials, with examples related to MSE and harvest strategies along with a good understanding of tuna fisheries in the Western and Central Pacific Ocean.
- Demonstrated experience developing MSE modelling frameworks and general experience in fisheries assessment and statistical modelling.
- Skills in code development for fisheries analysis.

6. Drifting Fish Aggregation Devices (dFADs)

- Demonstrated practical experience working with fishing industry on research and development projects.
- Excellent face-face communications skills with vessel skippers, crew and company managers.
- Demonstrated experience running training workshops in construction of fishing gear, in particular, Fish Aggregation Devices.
- Good knowledge of the tuna fisheries in the Western Pacific, in particular the operations of tuna purse seiners.
- Experience working closely with Pacific Island communities and local fisheries officers and community leaders.
- Skills in written communication in English, and basic data management.

F. Duty station and travel

The consultant(s) will generally be home-based. Depending on the nature and extent of work, travel to Noumea, New Caledonia, or other sites within the Pacific Islands region, may be required. Economy class airfares and per diems at SPC rates, consistent with SPC Travel policy, will be either covered separately by SPC, or negotiated as part of individual implementation agreements with SPC.

Part 4: PROPOSAL EVALUATION MATRIX

4.1 Evaluation criteria & score weight

A two-stage procedure will be utilised to evaluate the proposals, with evaluation of the **Technical proposal** being completed prior to any **Financial proposal** being opened and compared.

The competencies which will be evaluated are detailed in [Part 3](#).

The evaluation matrix below also reflects the obtainable score specified for each evaluation criterion (technical requirement) which indicates the relative significance or weight of the items in the overall evaluation process.

The technical component, which has a total possible value of **700 points**, will be evaluated using the following criteria.
